Stand by for the repeal of the 18th amendment, and we feel sure that you will then have the pleasure of enjoying our interesting programs.

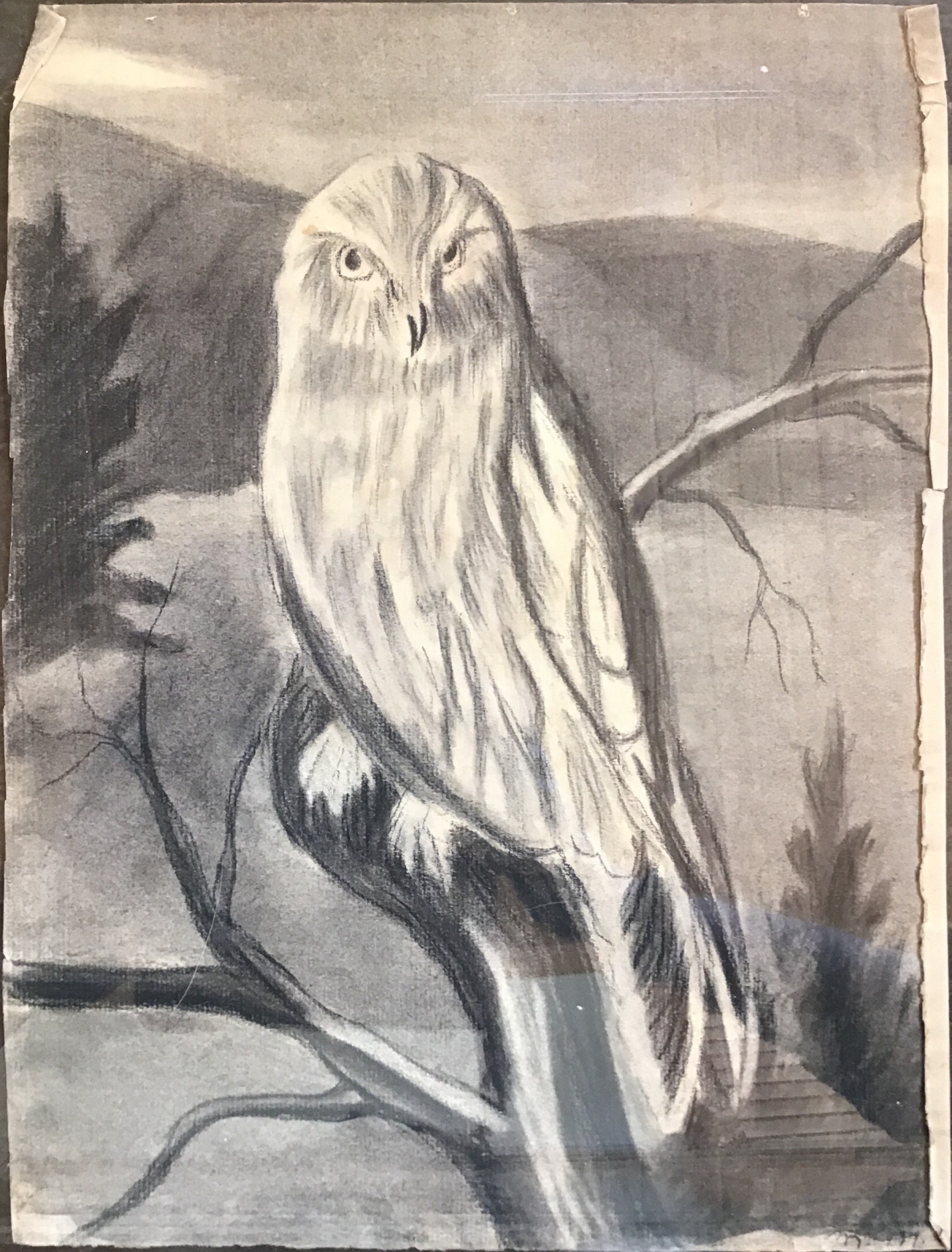
