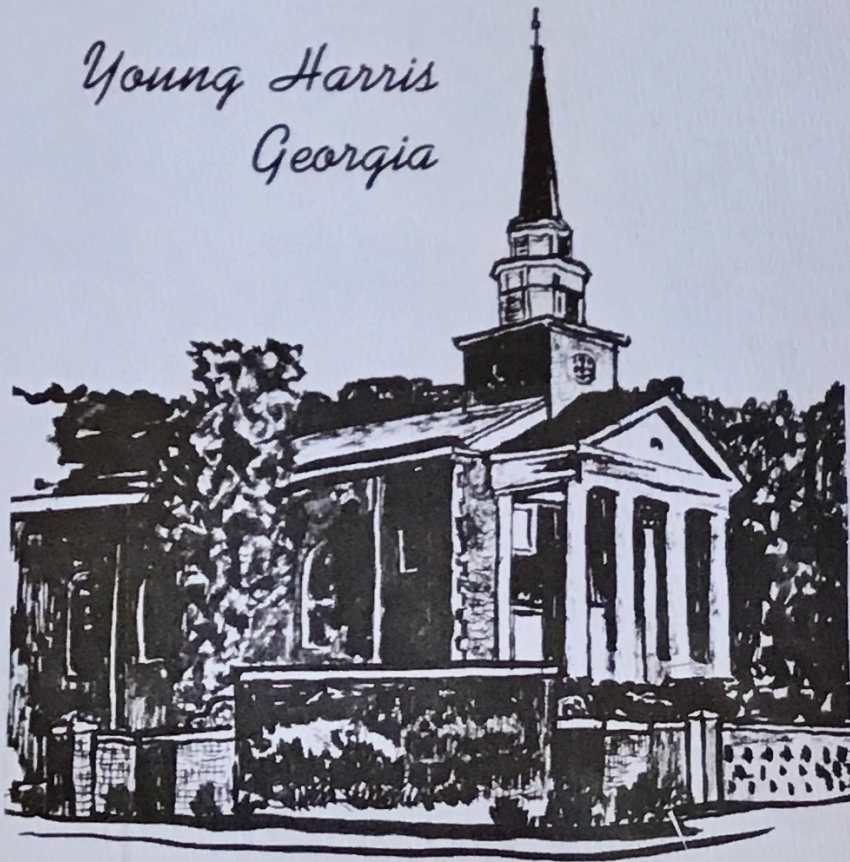

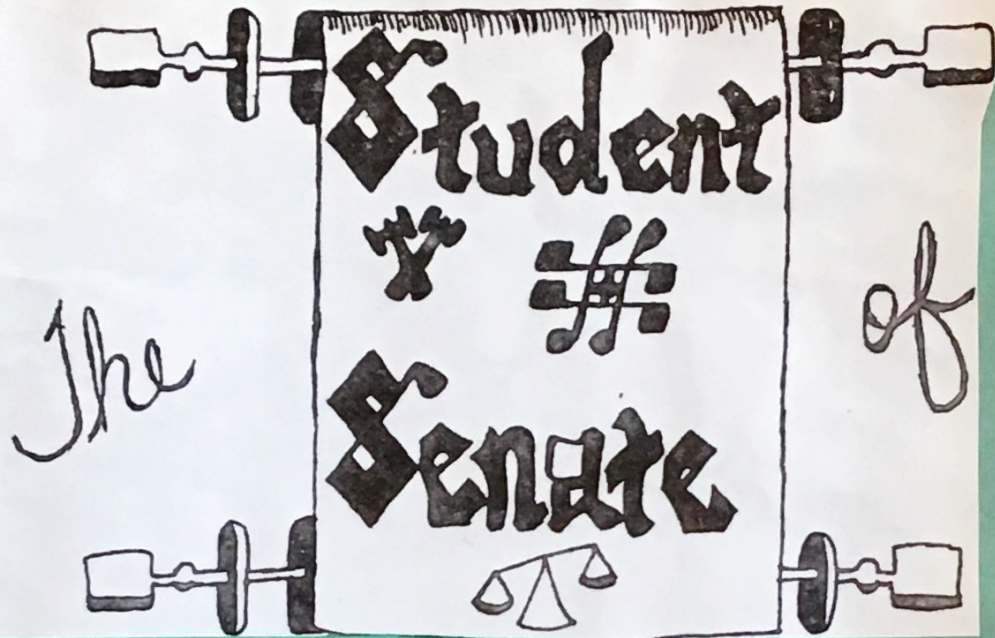

Prospective Students Come To Campus

On October 15, persons having an interest in Young Harris College will be on campus for Prospective Students Weekend. This program began in 1979; it gives students an opportunity to see

what academic, as well as social, life here at YHC consists of.

This year the Admissions Staff will be able to give each student an immediate estimate of his or her eligibility for financial aid. The students are sent forms pertaining to their family's financial status. When completed, the student may sit down with an Admissions Counselor and they will compute the amount of financial aid for which he/she is eligible.

During the day, the students will meet with faculty members, eat lunch in the dining hall, attend a planetarium presentation, and tour the campus.

This is only the first of several Prospective Student/Parent Weekends that will be held this year.

Prospective Students Visit Campus

On October 15, Young Harris' Admissions Office held a Prospective Student weekend for possible freshmen of the 1984-85 school year, as well as for their parents. The purpose of the weekend was to encourage high school seniors to visit the campus and to introduce them on a somewhat informal level to campus life.

The small group (approximately 45 people in all) arrived late Saturday morning due to traffic, according to George Dyer, Director of Admissions. Donuts and coffee were awaiting the visitors in Clegg lounge, and several faculty members chatted with them. They proceeded to Maxwell Center to

listen to Dr. Farley speak to them about some of the history behind Young Harris College. Next, Ms. Jeffery presented a short program concerning financial aid. Mr. Westlake showed a collection of past planetarium programs, and the group then went on to lunch. Mr. Dyer spoke to them about admissions and transfer credits, and Dr. Hale gave the group a student handbook and explained his position at YHC. The end of the day came quickly, and they finally made their way to the tour of the school.

They made instant friendships with the tour guides, besides obtaining a lot of information over a short period of time. Overall, it was a very successful day!

Open House Issue Reopens

Our Student Senate will focus on open house procedures in the coming weeks. There will be much discussion on this issue and sometimes in the near future a vote will decide whether or not this policy will be enacted for this year.

Last year, as some will recall, a three week trial of the plan ran successfully. Men were allowed to visit girls' dorms on either Sunday or Thursday of a given week. Women were permitted to visit male dorms on the alternate day. The hours were from 7:00 to 10:00 p.m. only.

The plan required students to check in with the person they were visiting,

leave their I.D. card, and return with their host when they checked out. Visitors wore special stickers to indicate their status. They could only visit the room of the person they checked in with. The door was required to stay open.

While this procedure was and is tedious and time consuming, it is better than no open house at all. The involved check in/out procedures are to protect the school from possible violations of policy and morals. Any reinstatement of open house will require the same or similar groundrules.

Also, student senators give up a great deal of time to operate open house. There are

three dorms to be open at a time; each requires several people to monitor check-in and to patrol the hallways.

It is a shame that mature, college-aged students aren't trusted enough with a more liberal policy. The mere threat of losing such a policy would keep students from abusing it. Yet human nature dictates that the conditions attached to Young Harris College's open house will remain for the time being.

These conditions jeopardize the entire idea of open house. The man hours involved in supervising open house are volunteer; these volunteers already sacrifice a great deal of time as senators.

These students have a need to study and to do other things with their time.

Perhaps some other organizations will volunteer to assist Student Senate. This would make the work-load at least possible.

Hopefully a policy of some kind will be enacted to fairly allow students to visit members of the opposite sex in their rooms. Something will arise to lessen the burdens in the system. God willing, the future of open house is bright. One day a more liberal policy will occur. Meanwhile, students together should demonstrate our willingness to co-operate by not abusing whatever program is adopted this year.

Student Senate Visitation Program

In Effect

On Sunday, January 15, the new student Senate Visitation Program went into effect. The men's dorms participated in the program first, the ladies' dorms will be next on January 22. Each Sunday thereafter the visitations will alternate between the mens' and ladies' dorms, until the week before final exams for Winter Quarter.

The program was used in experiment form in the 82-83 school year, and has been

renewed basically the same. The few changes made are these: 1) The student who meets the visitor at the door does not have to accompany them throughout the entire visit, the visitor is free to walk to other rooms. 2) A name tag need not be worn this year during the visit, and 3) the visitor can pick up his/her ID and leave without the student who picked them up.

The two sides for support seem to be these. Most

students are in favor; they believe the program will work and be enjoyable. On the other side, some students seem to feel that the noise level could get out of hand and studying will be hard.

If all rules are compiled with, all students can perhaps be pleased making the new Visitation Program a success. It should be noted however, if the program is not used wisely or if it is not taken advantage of, the Student Senate has the right to vote it's elimination.

Greek Organizations Sponsor Scholarships

Many people at YHC observe the social activities of the fraternities and sororities on campus without realizing the good these organizations do for others. Several of them sponsor college-administered academic scholarships for deserving students, while others have worthy pet projects that they make money to support.

Alpha Iota does not sponsor a scholarship, but does many service projects during the year. Last year they did extensive work and contributions toward the school library.

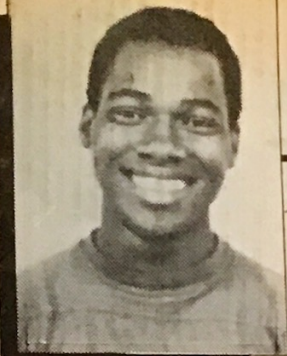

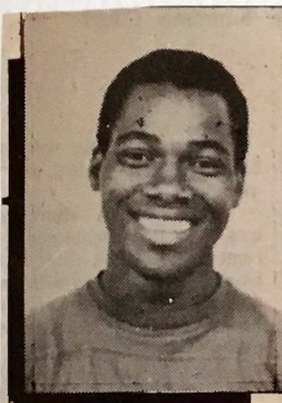

will be a service in the Sharp Fellowship Hall on April 18th. This will be an Easter service with the congregation of the church. We will be taking communion.

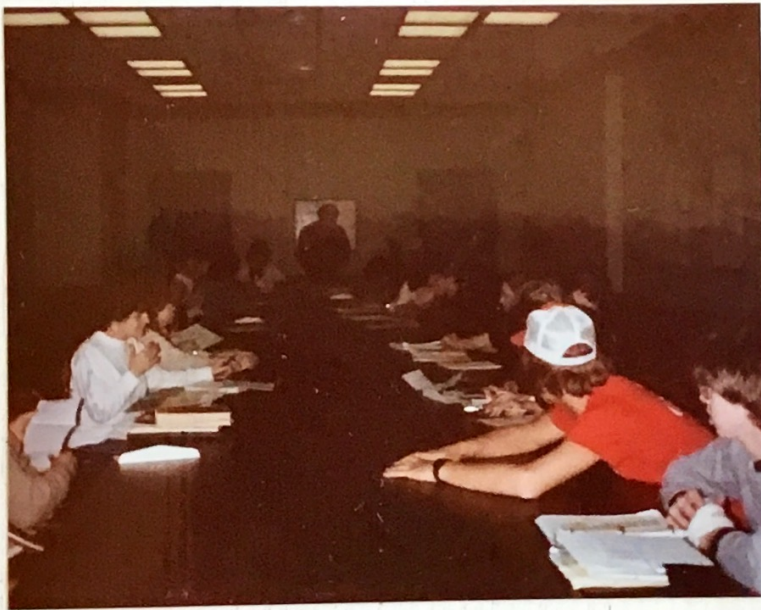
Another activity coming up is the spring concert. The concert will be performed by a christian group from the University of Georgia. The name of the group is "Celebration".

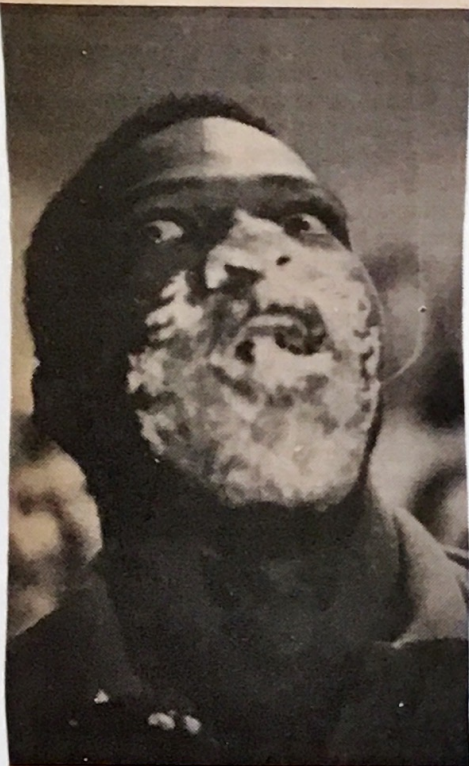

"Stripes" and "CC10" will be reshown. Cloggers will perform at the Springfest Barbeque.

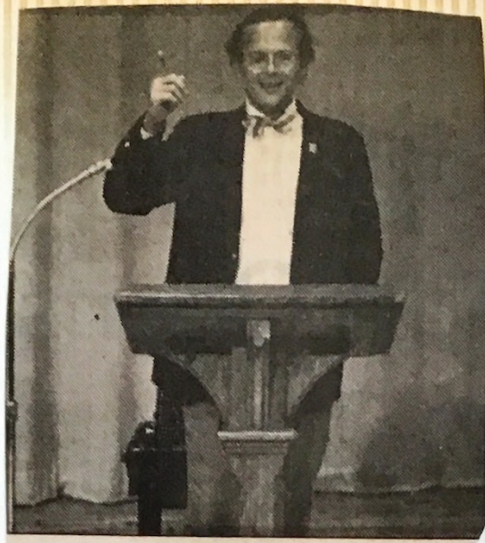

Franklin Elected President

UPI - David Byrd Franklin has been elected the 42nd president of the United States. He and his running mate, Jessie Helms, watched the returns in his North Georgia Ranch. He beat Walter Mondale, his democratic opponent, by a 56 to 44 percent margin. He carried California, New England, most of the mid-west, Florida, and his native state, Alabama.

Speaking this morning at Young Harris College, the former history professor remarked, "My success is a sure sign of America's willingness to restore old-fashioned liberalism." He announced some of his nominations for cabinet positions. Fred Whitley refused to comment on his appointment as secretary of state. Bob Richardson announced his plans to make six entire western states a national park as his first act as Secretary of the Interior.

Appointee, Dr. James Hale, new Attorney General was in the third hour of his acceptance speech when this went to press. Franklin announced his intent to create a new department of Entertainment and offered former

president Ronald "Bedtime for Bonzo" Reagan the job. Also nominated were David Roebuck as Ambassador to the UN; Jessie Jackson, Ambassador to Africa; Jimmy Carter as Ambassador to Antarctica; and Richard Nixon, Budget Director.

The Franklin campaign has been remarkable; he won the Republican nomination shortly after the national scandal that revealed Reagan to be a polish national without a visa. He instantly won the appeal of the masses with his famous "Don't sit on the side dangling your feet, Dive In!" speech.

He wants to divert the entire Defense budget into funds for Education and the Arts. He's opposed to capital punishment and would like to repeal the eighth amendment so punishments worse than death can be inflicted.

The nation should soon see the liberal swing of this awkwardly republican administration. Franklin promises to replace "The Star Spangled Banner," with "Burning Down the House" as our national anthem. He should surely be an interesting chapter in American History

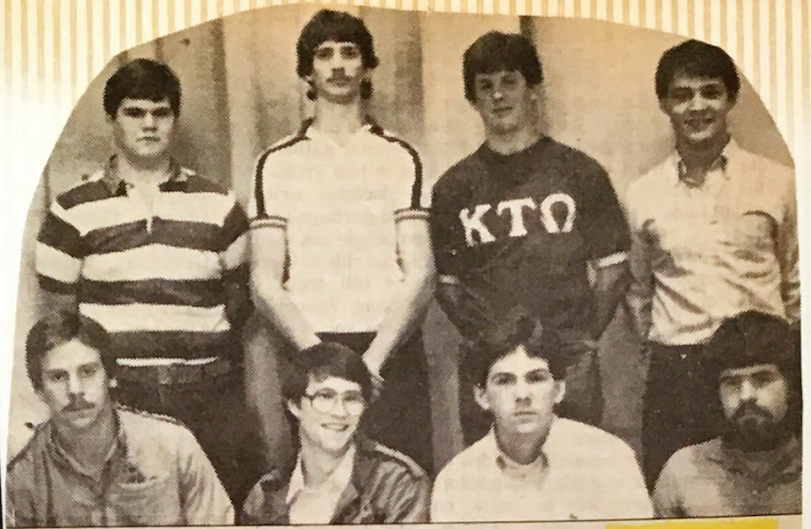

"It is our dream for the Student Senate to reach further in serving the Young Harris campus. We are already busy planning our common goals, and planning the calendar for the 1984-85 school year.

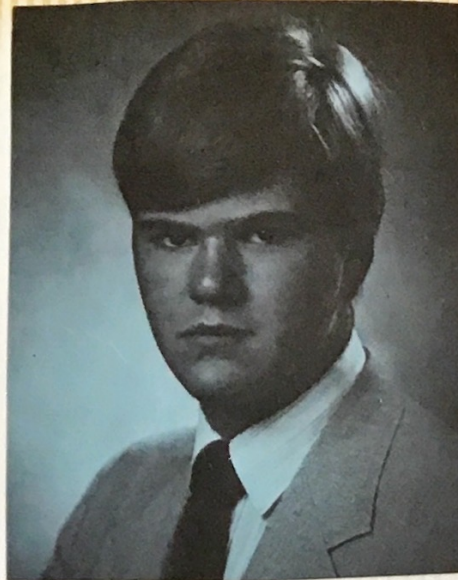
Please let us know of any ideas you have to make your senate more productive. After all we are here to serve you.

Runners Needed For 10K Race

BSU is sponsoring the second Annual Georgia Mountain 10K Challenge as it's contribution to the student senate Springfest. This 6.2 mile road race will be run over Young Harris Mountain and end back on campus in the midst of the fest.

Registration is from 8:00 to 9:00 here in front of P-B on May 5, and from 9:00 to 9:30 for late-comers at the starting line. The race starts at 9:30 and a bus will be leaving here at 9:00 to transport interested

people to the fairgrounds where the race begins.

The course is "hilly", its entire length, especially near the midpoint where a runner must scramble up the steep side of the Young Harris Mountain. He then enters the valley with a mile and a half descent down the mountain.

Medical Aid and transportation for those who can't finish will be available. Water stops are planned and full preparations will make this a professionally done event.

Every pre-registered finisher gets a T-shirt, others that finish also win the shirt but size isn't guaranteed. The entry fee is \$5 pre-registered or \$6 on the race day. Share the word about this special road race with all your friends from home; encourage them to come up to the race and stay for the fest.

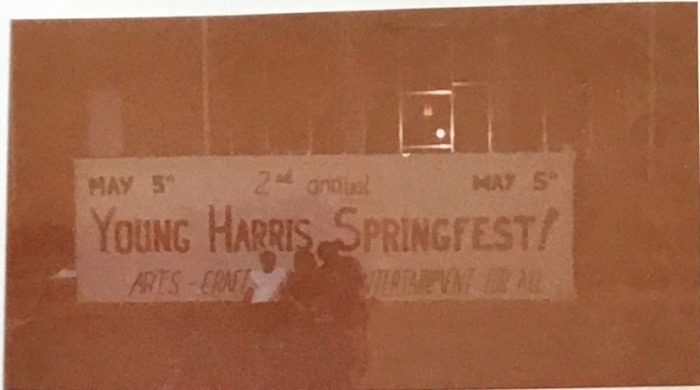
As a necessary precaution please note: The Georgia Mountain Challenge is a moderately difficult course, it requires a prepared runner,

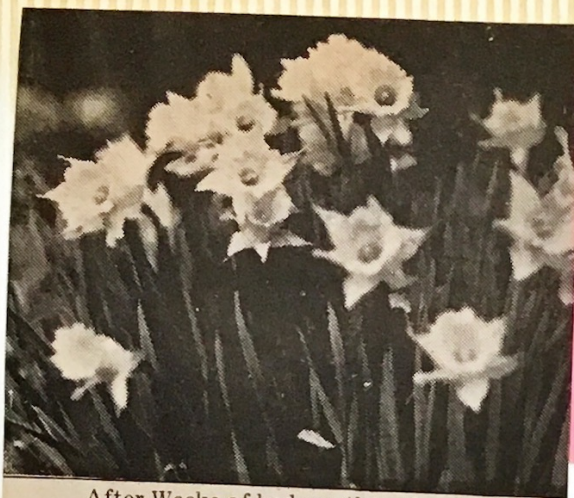

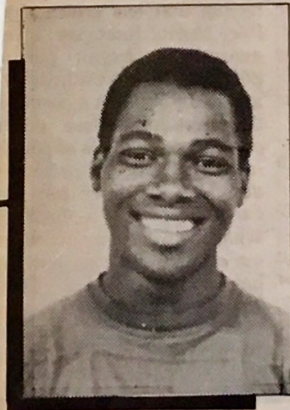
I would like to express my appreciation for the work that went into making SPRINGFEST an exciting experience for all who were fortunate enough to be here this weekend.

HISTORY AND TRADITIONS

Young Harris College came into existence as the result of the Christian concern and care of Artemus Lester, a circuit riding Methodist minister. Mr. Lester saw the lack of educational opportunities in this area and was determined to correct the situation. He, along with other interested friends, selected Marcus H. Edwards to open a school in January, 1886 in the community of McTyeire, to be known as the McTyeire Institute. Later the name of the Institute and the community was changed to Young Harris, honoring Young Loftin Gerdine Harris, a resident of Athens, Georgia, and the first great benefactor of the institution.

Young Harris was first chartered as a four-year degree granting institution, but courses of study were offered from grade one through senior college. The last Bachelor degrees were awarded in 1916, but the College continued as a junior college with an academy division. In 1958 the academy was discontinued, and the College now operates as a fully accredited junior college.

Through the years a rich and proud heritage has evolved at Young Harris College. The central theme of Christian care and concern still provides the basic foundations for relationships at Young Harris. Because of its size, its location in the beautiful Brass-town Valley and its isolation from the mainstream of life, students confront themselves very quickly and find it necessary to evaluate their lives. As always, students of today need love, understanding, support and friendship which they find at Young Harris. At Young Harris students are urged to believe in the future, operate with faith and trust deeply.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Young Harris College endeavors to provide the first two years of a liberal arts education of high quality, to supplement its curriculum with enriching activities outside the classroom, to ease the transition from high school to senior college, to serve as a cultural and educational center, and to create and maintain on its campus a Christian community.

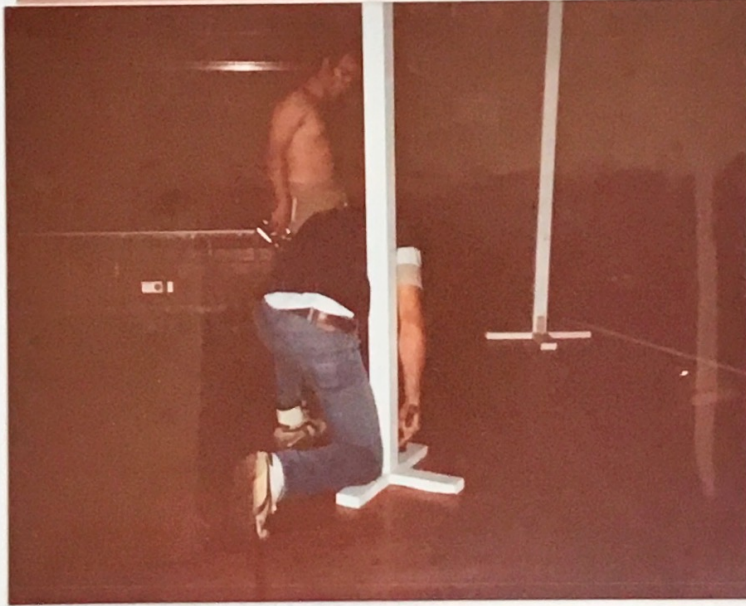

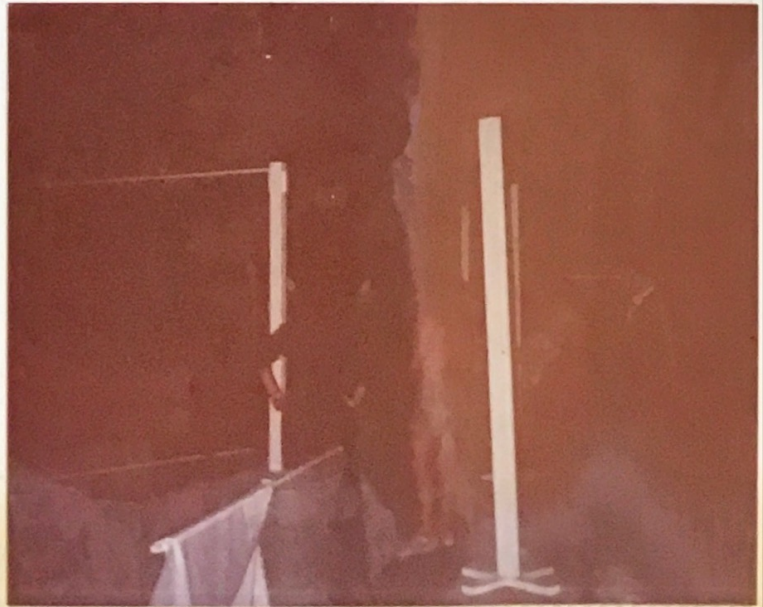


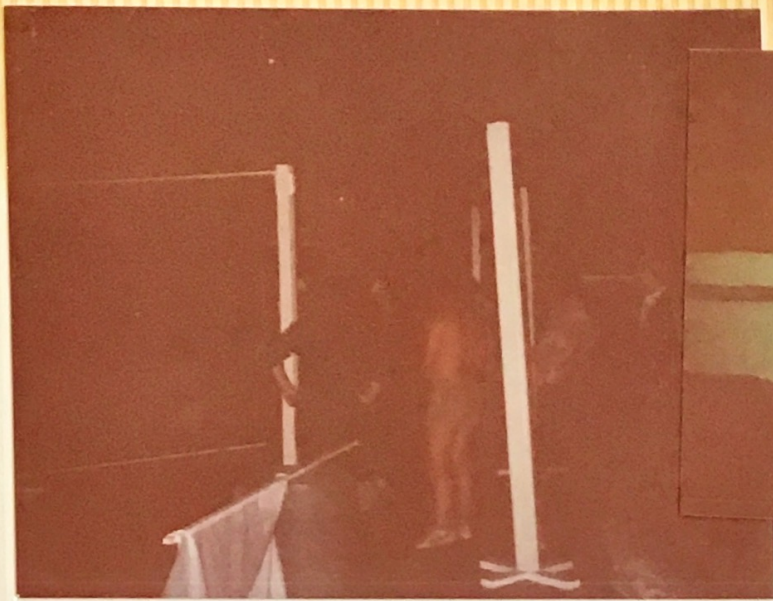
