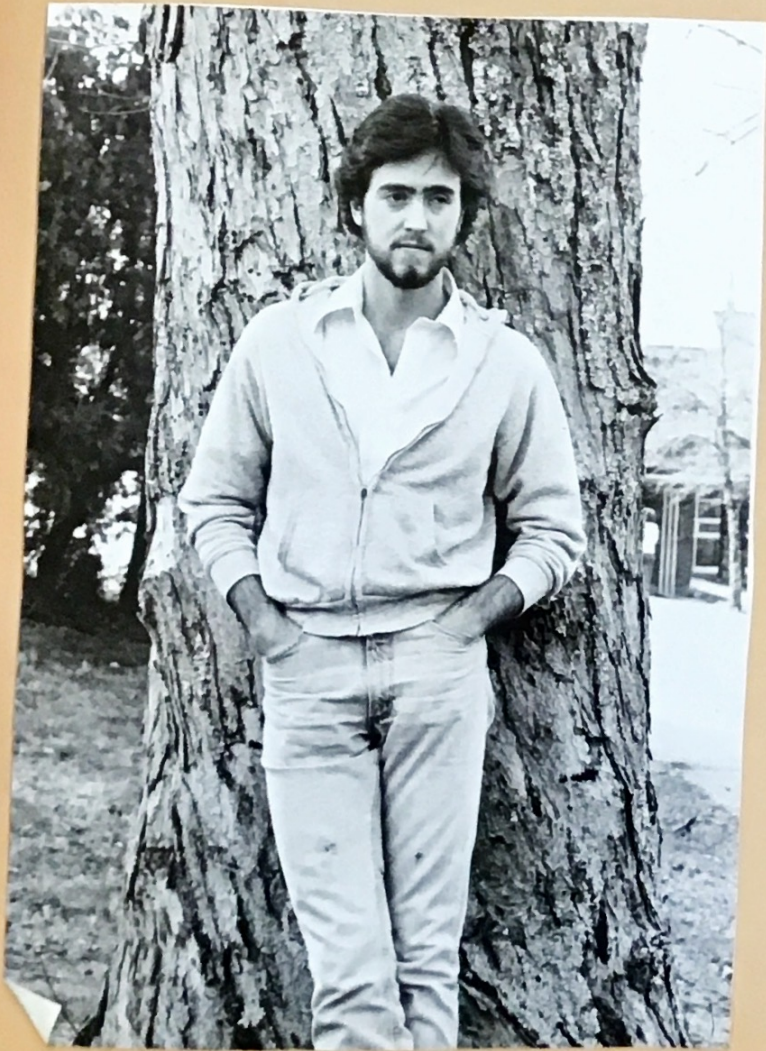
I would personally like to thank the students who voted and commend them for doing so. I really appreciated the student's support and I promise that I will do my job to the best of my ability.

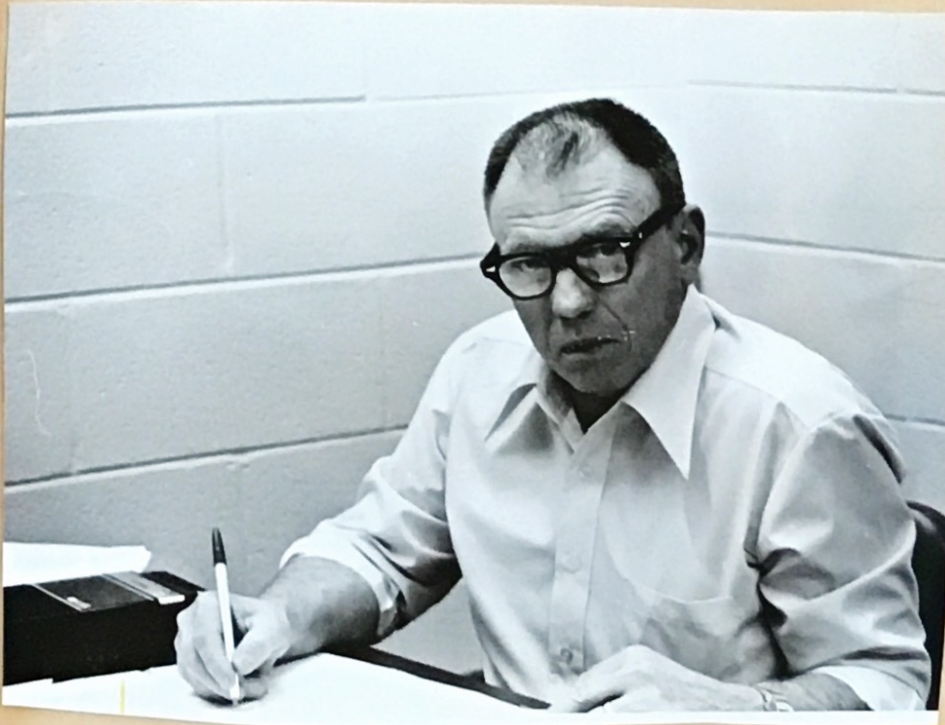

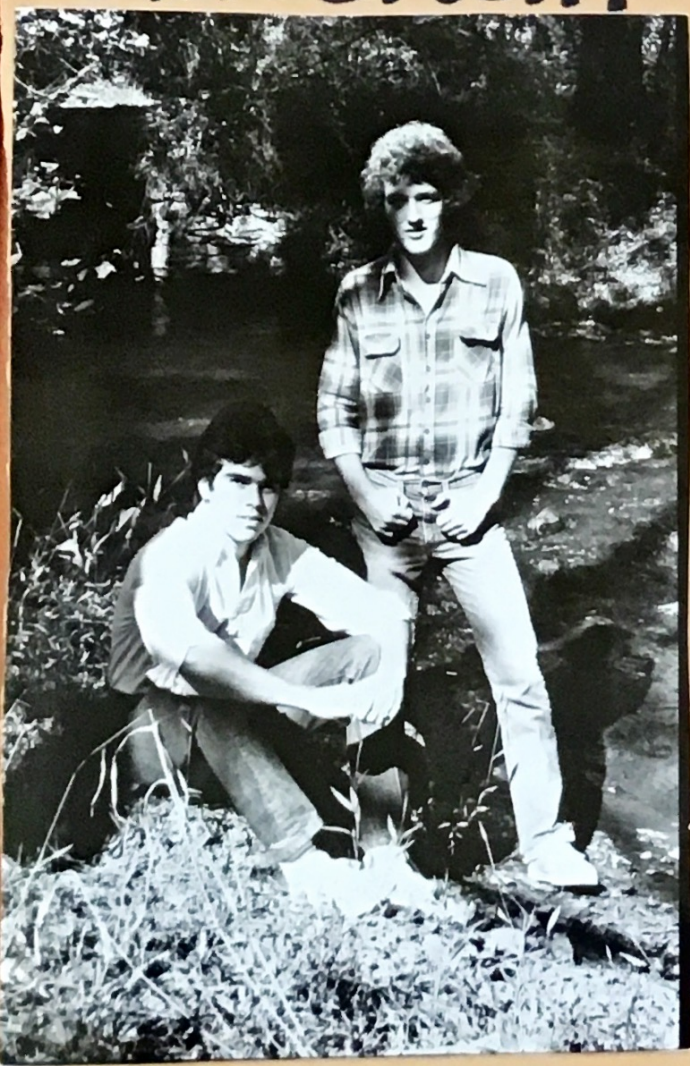

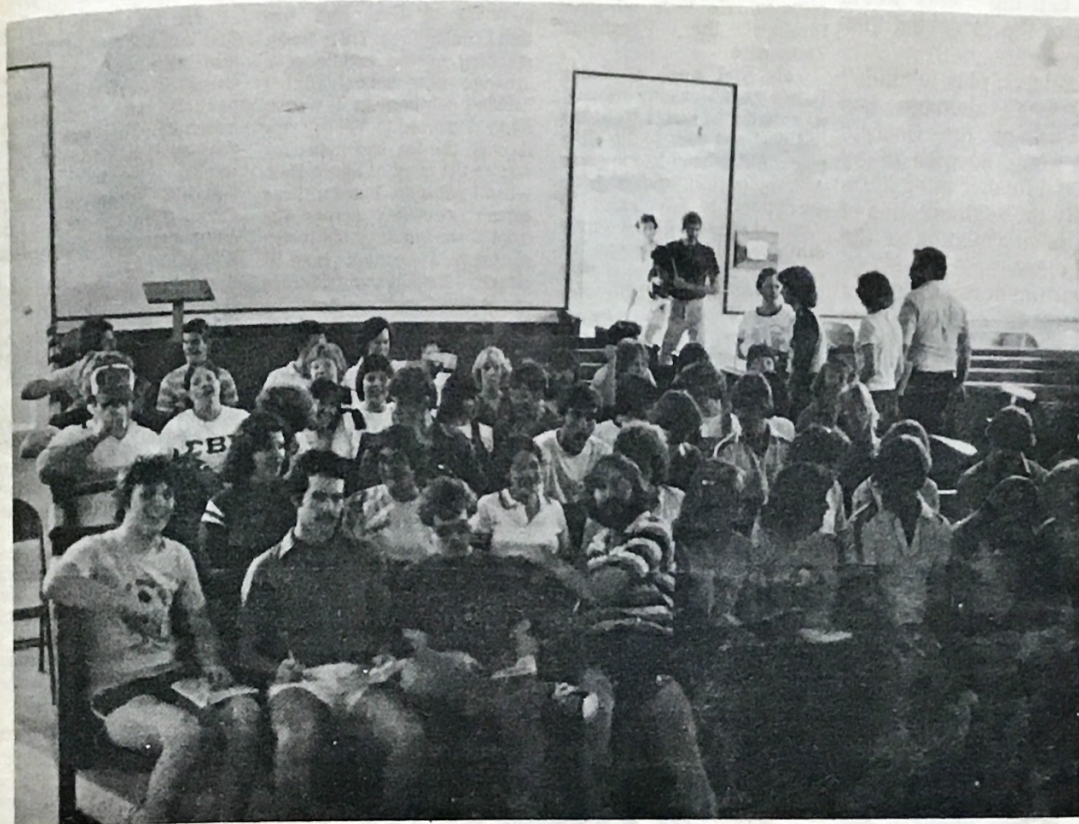
