College Celebrates 100th Birthday

Young Harris College celebrated its centennial last Thursday with a birthday party amid a swirl of purple and white balloons, fireworks, skits, and even a re-enactment of Rev. Artemas Lester's first visit to the area.

As students and faculty members crowded into the gymnasium, the celebration began with a parade that culminated with college President Ray Farley popping out of a cake.

Rev. Fred Whitley served as master of ceremonies as a variety of satirical skits traced the history of the school.

The skits included Rev. John Kay portraying school founder Artemas Lester; Bettie Sellers as Susan B. Harris; and Rev. Cecil Page as Judge Young L. G. Harris.

College trustee James Mathis joined the students and faculty in a candle light ceremony that concluded in the singing of

the Alma Mater.

Following the party, the activities moved outdoor for a fireworks display.

On Sunday, the college began a more serious celebration with tolling of the Susan B. Harris Chapel bell. Loman Shook, Director of Maintenance at the school was in charge of tolling the bell.

The centennial message was delivered by Bishop Ernest Fitzgerald during special ser-

VICES at the Sharpe Memorial Church.

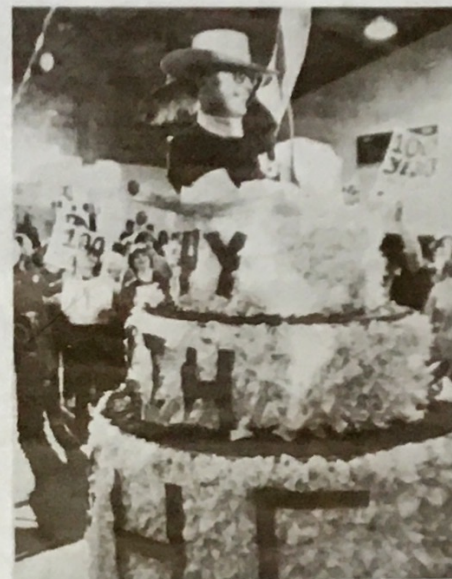
The celebration activities continued into afternoon with an exhibit of art works by Lamar Dodd. The event was the first of an annual series of art exhibitions sponsored in memory of Alice Hirt who had been co-owner of the Campus Gate and active in a number of community projects.

Following the art exhibit, the Clegg Auditorium was packed to capacity to hear a centennial concert by the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra.

The celebration of the college's 100th birthday continued on into the week with a series of featured speakers.

Admiral Stansfield Turner, former director of the CIA and former President of the National War College, lectured Monday.

On Tuesday, a program was presented by poet John Clardi. A program by Major General Michael Collins, America's third spacewalker, is planned for Wednesday night. Thursday a reader's theatre performance of "Bitterberry" is planned. The performance is based on the works of Byron Herbert Reece.

Discrimination Complaint Expected To Be Filed

A sex discrimination in employment complaint is expected to be filed in connection with the recent dismissal of Deputy Janet Hunnicutt from the Towns County Sheriff's Department.

Hunnicutt, on advice of her attorney Eric Kocher, declined to make a statement.

The Herald was unable to contact Attorney Kocher to confirm if the complaint had been filed, but a law partner of Kocher's did confirm that a complaint was in the works.

The pending complaint.

On December 31, the last day of her employment with the Towns County Department, Hunnicutt filed two warrants with the Probate Judge's office. The warrants charged Gail G. Roach, the Sheriff's ex-wife, with simple battery and with "using telephone communications for obscene, threatening, harassing, etc. purposes."

Towns County Sheriff Rudy

Roach offered no statement on the dismissal of Hunnicutt beyond confirmation that she "is no longer employed" with the Towns County Sheriff's Department.

Roach said a replacement had not be chosen. Until the staff position is filled, Towns County Sheriff's auxiliary members will be assisting at the Sheriff's office in Hiawassee, according to Roach.

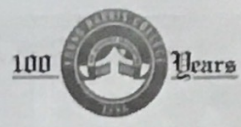

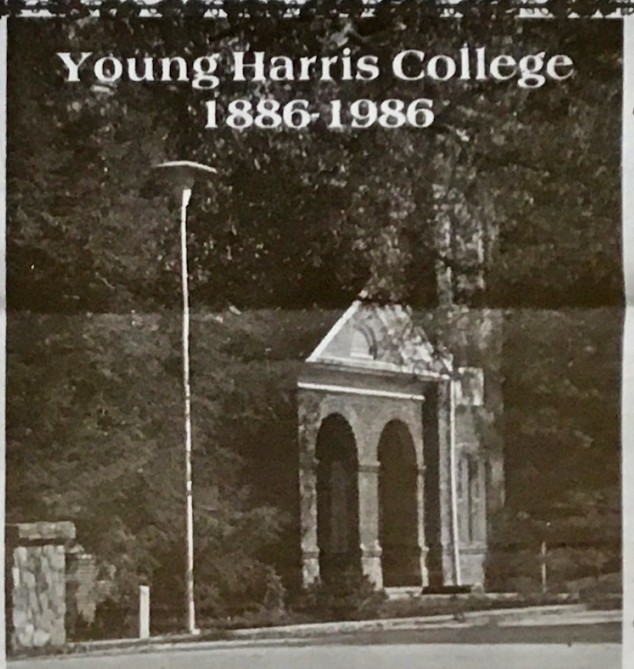

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Recognized as one of the outstanding artists of his time, 80 year old Julian Harris was born in Carrollton, Georgia. His long and illustrious career includes the design and execution of sculptures for 50 public buildings in the Southeast, including seven buildings in Atlanta, 55 portrait and memorial commissions, including a bronze portrait bust of Robert Woodruff for the lobby of the Emory University Library, and a bronze figure of John Wesley for West Virginia Wesleyan College. He designed and executed the Official Inaugural Medal for President Jimmy Carter, 1977, the Georgia Tech Centennial Medal, 1983, and the Georgia Medal of Honor, 1986.

A Fellow in both the American Institute of Architects and the National Sculpture Society, Mr. Harris taught in the College of Architecture at Georgia Tech for 34 years, and received as Professor Emeritus in 1971. In December 1983, he received the Alumni Distinguished Service Award from Georgia Tech.

The sculptor continues his distinguished career as he works in his studio in Atlanta, now assisted by young Atlanta sculptor Marvin Dewe.

ALICE ANN HIRT (1924-1983) was co-owner of the Campus Gate and an avid supporter of both student and community activities in Young Harris. The Alice Hirt Exhibition Endowment has been established in her memory to provide an annual art exhibition as a service to Young Harris College students and the community.

ALICE ANN HIRT was born in Terre Haute, Indiana, on December 26, 1924. She graduated from Indiana State University and worked with Eastern Airlines from 1949 to 1963. In 1964, Alice moved with Jo Bearse to Young Harris, Georgia, where they lived at Crow Gap Farm until Alice's death on December 6, 1983. Alice was well known to students and community residents as co-owner of The Campus Gate. An avid supporter of both student and community activities, she served on the Boards of the American Red Cross and the Mountain Regional Library, was a member of the Brasstown Valley Art Association and an active participant in her church, St. Francis of Assisi. For twenty years Alice's life served as an instrument for peace and love in this valley.

The Alice Hirt Art Exhibition Endowment has been established in her memory to provide an annual art exhibition as a service to Young Harris College students and the community.

FROM THE ARTIST

The Centennial Medallion symbolizes all that is traditional at Young Harris College. The obverse side of the medallion shows the Susan B. Harris Chapel with the gazebo to the south. The reverse side of the medallion is divided vertically into three parts. The equestrian figure of the College Founder, circuit riding minister, Reverend Artemas Lester, moves through the lowered center panel. In the left panel, students climb the highest mountain in the range, stopping to enjoy the view below. In the right panel, students study on the campus lawn, surrounded by mountain laurel and other native flora. The mountains, rising above the campus and moving across the circular medallion, are authentically sculpted to encircle the valley in which the College has flourished for 100 years.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

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ABOUT THE COLLEGE

"The Chattahoochee splashes from the rocks of the highest escarpment and, becoming a stream, flows south and east. The Tallulah merges with lakes, emerges and joins with other streams to become the Savannah. The Hiwassee flows north into the Tennessee Valley.

A few minutes by car from each of these headwaters is a school — Young Harris College. Rarely does any school have as neighbor the symbolism of its life. The waters of her teachings and her truths have supplied perhaps more Methodist ministers than any school of her size. Some have become bishops. Judges and attorneys of note have come from her portals, including two Chief Justices of Georgia's Supreme Court, a former governor of the state, superintendents of schools, teachers, good citizens — all of these have flowed like the mountain streams into the life of the state, the South, the nation, to enrich and serve."

### Iranian Hostage Ragsdale Lecturer

Who could ever forget the return from Iran of our brave men and women? Especially will Georgians have imprinted on our hearts and minds the cavalcade bearing Colonel Charles W. Scott through suburban Atlanta streets whose trees were tied with untold thousands of yellow ribbons!

It was indeed an honor to have Col. Scott on campus this month to speak to the student body and guests on "America at War: The Fight Against Terrorism." His opening statement of "When I say it's a pleasure to be here, it's not a trite remark or a trivial statement. You know some of the places I've been," brought back the horror fellow Americans endured for over 14 months.

The North Georgia News, a local paper, reports: "Scott said that because of our prior reactions to terrorists, America has been perceived as weak in many parts of the world. The biggest mistake America made during the Iranian hostage situation was in holding up its end of the Algerian Accords, in which President Carter agreed to provide Iran with the \$8 billion of frozen assets upon release of the hostages, by living up to our

agreement, we recognized the effectiveness of terrorist actions. Scott said one of the major difficulties in fighting terrorists is in the country's failure to recognize acts of terrorism as declarations of war." Col. Scott's response to a question about Reagan's decision to attack Libya was that he should have "gone in strong enough to change how people think about a political philosophy or ideology." He also credited the media for keeping the hostage crisis in the news, and felt such wide and constant coverage had a great deal to do with saving their lives.

Retired from the Army since April 1981, Col. Charles W. Scott has been a Mideast consultant for a number of corporations. He writes a weekly defense and foreign affairs analysis for the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution* and is in demand for speaking engagements. His book, "Pieces of the Game," a first person account of his 444 days as a hostage in Iran, was awarded the Dixie Council of Authors and Journalists "Author of the Year" Award in non-fiction in 1984.

The Ragsdale Lecture Series brings to our campus annually a speaker of national stature to discuss governmental and political matters of timely interest. It has been made possible through an endowment funded by Mr. and Mrs. H.D. Paris to honor Mrs. Paris' cousin, Mr. Warner B. Ragsdale, Class of 1917, who has had a long and distinguished career in journalism.

### Trustees Visit Campus

In April, five members of the Board of Trustees visited the Young Harris campus: Dr. Cecil Myers, Rev. David Haygood, Mr. Ben Chask, Dr. Thomas Glenn, and Mr. Gene Hughes were at the College to meet student leaders for a day of mutual interaction and to learn more about each other's activities and concerns.

The day began with a reception sponsored by the Dorcas Club and Phi Delta Sorority. Afterward, the trustees accompanied several student leaders to their classes, which ranged from art to physics. The trustees toured the campus, and completed the day with a forum in the Chapel that provided information about how Y.H.C. policy is made and how the Board of Trustees functions.

The idea for Trustees' Day was conceived by the Student Senate Executive Committee and was a positive experience for all concerned.

### Halley's Comet: Farewell To A Friend

The Comet is on its way out. With each day that passes, the gulf between us grows by two million miles. Halley's has become the most widely observed and thoroughly studied comet in history, but the time has come to bid the Comet a fond farewell.

I remember one clear frosty March morning on Brasstown Bald, while I was busily taking my usual series of observations, feeling a tap-tap on my shoulder. Turning in the darkness, I shone my red-filtered flashlight on an elderly woman huddled up against the cold. She informed me that she had seen Halley's Comet as a child in 1910 and she wanted more than anything to see it again. Carefully aligning and focusing the Comet's image in the eyepiece of my telescope, I offered her a look. She peered into the lens for a few moments, glanced skyward, squinted back into the lens, then stepped away and said, "You mean I waited 76 years for that?"

Her reaction, I think, captured many people's disappointment with Halley's meager 1985 performance. Being entirely fair, though, it really wasn't the Comet's fault. The earth itself was in terrible location to see the Comet as it wheeled around the sun. Combine that with the growing light pollution problem and many folks can consider themselves lucky to have seen Halley's at all!

Nevertheless, those of us who took the trouble to rise early and face the cold morning air during March were treated to a very nice comet show. Easily visible to the unaided eye, Halley's sported a tail one full hand-span in length. I won't ever forget seeing the Comet there in the multi-colored dawn from Brasstown Bald.

After spending every clear moonless night with Halley's Comet during the last nine months, I really feel like I'm seeing a good friend for the last time. I've shared a piece of history with family, students, friends and lots of unknown voices under the star-filled sky. Halley's won't be back until the year 2061.

### *The Honorable Jody Powell Homecoming Speaker*

Born in Georgia during World War II, Jody Powell attended public school in the small town of Vienna. He matriculated at the U.S. Air Force Academy from 1961 to 1964; in 1966 he was graduated from Georgia State University with a BA in political science. Powell became involved in the 1970 gubernatorial campaign of Jimmy Carter, working as a volunteer while he was still in graduate school at Emory University in Atlanta.

After finishing school in May 1970, Powell joined Carter's staff and became the personal aide for the candidate. When Jimmy Carter became the Governor of Georgia, Powell was appointed Press Secretary—a position he held through the end of Carter's term as President of the United States.

Since January 1981, Jody Powell has been speaking to colleges, universities, and other groups. In January 1982 he began writing a twice-weekly column which is syndicated by the Los Angeles Times Syndicate and became a news analyst for ABC News, appearing on such shows as "This Week with David Brinkley," "Nightline," and "Good Morning America."

Powell's book, "The Other Side of the Story," about the press/presidency relationship, was published in April 1984 by

William Morrow & Company.

In addition, in January 1985, he was appointed to the Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, Jr. Professional Chair in American Politics at Boston College and is teaching a course on the press and the presidency.

Jody Powell is married to Nan Jared, a 1962 graduate of Young Harris College. They have one daughter, Emily, who is 19.

It is a privilege to have such a distinguished guest address our Centennial Homecoming meeting on Saturday, August 23rd, and to welcome back to campus his lovely wife, Nan.

## Jody Powell's Homecoming Address

Let me begin by expressing my admiration for and appreciation to Young Harris College, not for the dedicated political leaders, judges, business leaders, and countless ministers of the gospel it has produced, but for giving me the finest, most wonderful human being I've ever known - my wife Nan Jared Powell, Class of 1962.

You may or may not be aware that my presence here, today, is evidence of a most important and admirable characteristic of our American system of government. In many countries on this earth, when the people rise up and throw you out of office, they then stand you up against a wall and shoot you. Here they send you out on the lecture circuit to make speeches.

I might also say that you make a good bit more attractive and, I hope, better mannered audience than the White House press corps.

Occasions such as this are traditionally a time for celebration, reflection, advice, and speeches.

As far as advice is concerned, I find it amusing that newspapers and television networks now pay me rather handsomely for advice

that they rejected out of hand when I was giving it out for free from the White House.

As far as speeches go - and some do seem to go on forever - I promise not to spoil your celebration with a long one.

That leaves us with reflection. I've noticed that whenever people talk about Young Harris,

somewhere along the line they seem to feel obligated to mention that it sprang from humble and modest origins. Sometimes they seem to say it a little apologetically. They shouldn't. Almost everybody and everything I know that is worth knowing sprang from humble origins.

Think about it. How many people do you know of who ever contributed much of anything to anybody but themselves who sprang from immodest origins.

There are some: George Washington and Franklin

Roosevelt come to mind. But even they, I suspect, owed their capacity to lead and inspire, their place in history, their record of selfless service to the nation, to the fact that at one time or another in their lives they were humbled; they came to understand what it was to fight and struggle against seemingly insurmountable odds.

For Washington it was that long winter retreat from New York through the snows of New
