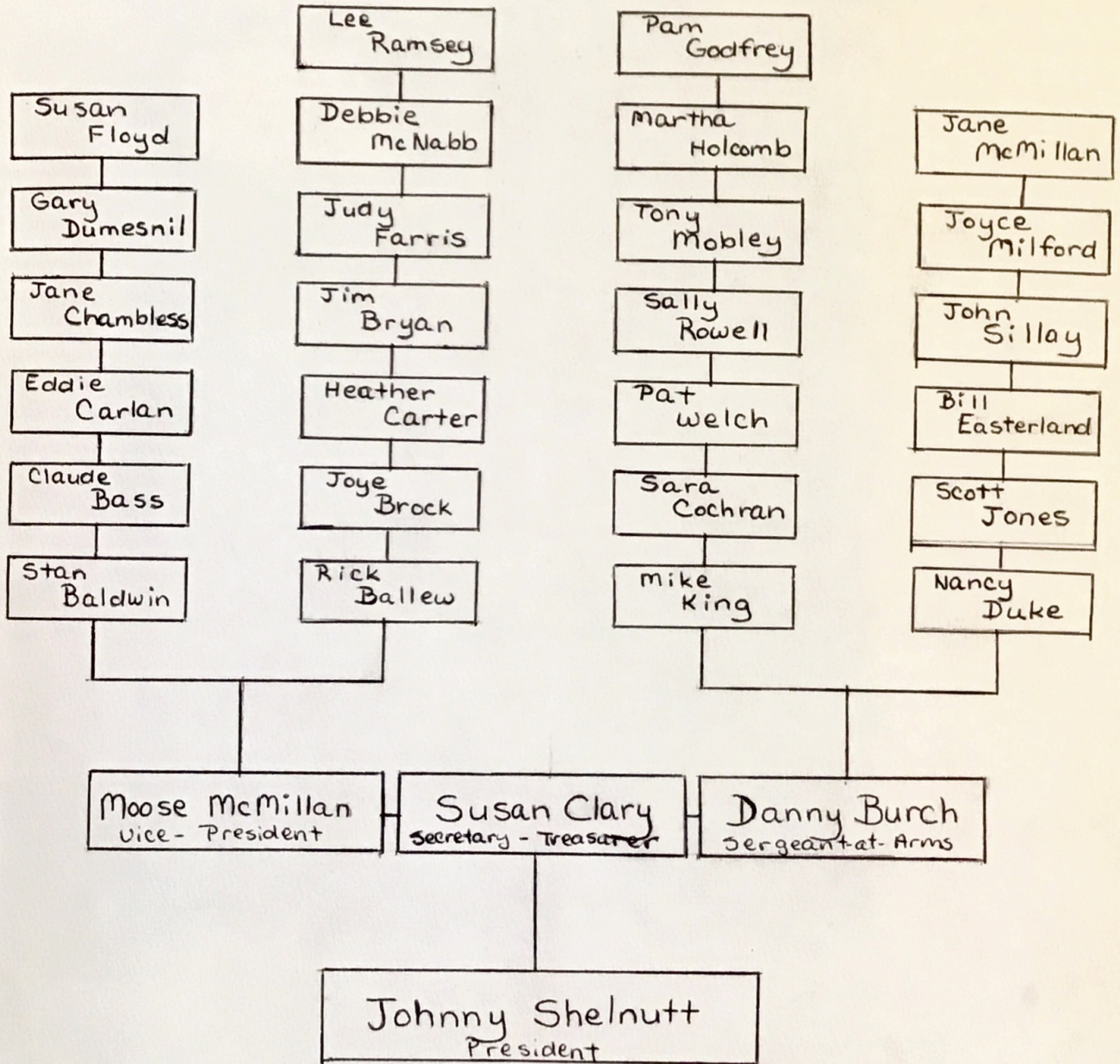
Then after looking over the residence halls and organizations, a hush fell round about and we saw that the chaos was good.

STUDENT SENATE MINUTES

The 1974-75 Student Senate of Young Harris College met on May 20, 1974. The meeting was called to order by President Johnny Shelnett. The roll was called. The new committees were re-read and Johnny explained their duties. Advertisement was self-explanatory. Moose McMillan, chairman of entertainment, discussed tentative plans and dates that have been drawn up for next year. For the month of September, the following events have been suggested: Saturday the 14th, a dance, and Saturday the 21st, a movie, "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid". For the month of November, a movie, "The Godfather", on Friday the 15th, and a dance on Saturday the 16th. Winter Quarter will open with a dance on January 4th, and a movie, "Day of the Jackal" on January the 11th. For the month of March, a movie, "Summer of 42", on Saturday the 1st, and a dance on Saturday the 29th. Spring Quarter opens with a movie, "Deliverance", on April the 5th, and a dance on April 19th. For the month of May, a movie, "Play It Again, Sam", on Saturday, the 24th. Moose stressed that these dates were only tentative. Johnny continued the explanation of the committees. Budget handles the money, and all checks written for Student Senate must be cleared through them. Food was self-explanatory. Miscellaneous is in charge of the cake race, and anything else that comes up and is assigned to them. Rules determine how the Senate meetings will be conducted. Discipline is in charge of parking and issuing of tickets. Johnny asked John Sillay to take a survey of the students on campus and determine their overall attitude toward ticketing and perhaps come up with a better method to handle this problem. Historian Reporter is in charge of the scrap book. Representative to the Board of Trustees attends all Trustee meetings, represents the student body, and reports back to the Senate. Representative to the Faculty attends all faculty meetings and does the same. Student Representatives to Convo attend all meetings of the Convocation committee and report back to the Senate. Johnny explained that he had put the same two people on this committee to narrow down the number of students working with the faculty and make it easier to get ideas across.

Keith Davis raised the question of whether or not John Rentz is still on the Senate, and Johnny replied that another member will be elected at the next meeting. He requested that everyone think about who this member might be, and remember the qualities of leadership, character, and the activity point system.

Johnny announced that Fall Quarter will begin on September 8, 1974, and that the Senate, President, and vice-president of all other organizations will return on September 6. Dean Wright stated that the entire Senate was not scheduled to come early, and Johnny said that with the amount of work to be taken care of, it is necessary for everyone to be here. Dean Wright said the matter will be discussed later. The question was raised--is the old Senate still Senate, or is the new Senate now official? Johnny said that the old is official until Honor's Day.

Johnny stressed that Senate members represent all of the student body, not individual Greek organizations. He requested that members seek out the students' ideas and bring any gripes before the Senate. The question was asked where the minutes are to be posted. They will be placed in the sign board by the Little Store.

John Sillay requested that the problem of Senate ticketing be discussed. He felt that the ticketing was rash and uncalled for, and asked that he be allowed to take it into his hands. He gave the example of the events that took place after the Phi Chi-Sig softball game. Phi Chi had had a meeting and some of their members had parked in front of Sharp. They received tickets for this and he felt this was unfair under the circumstances. Moose replied that parking regulations had been posted at the beginning of the year, and were expected to be followed at all times. Johnny stated that this was the reason he had requested that John do the survey, to look into problems like this one. John said that he felt there shouldn't be a half and half Senate, with the old Senate doing part and the new Senate doing part also. Johnny replied that this year's Senate was still official and would handle any major event that arose.

Dean Wright said he had a few things he would like to mention. He pointed out that traditionally almost ~~of-the~~ all of the Senate had been Sigs and Susan B.'s and sports had been KTO and Phi Chi. He knew that the societies were more important than student government to most students, and this had always hurt the Senate. He said that he been getting "a lot of hell" concerning ticketing, and had received a number of complaints that Sigs were ticketing everybody but Sigs and Susan B.'s. Johnny replied that he felt this was not true. He had been ^{elected} to serve the student body, not just the Sigs. There was much discussion on this situation and also

a discussion of apathy on campus. Dean Wright said that Sigs and Susan B.'s were traditionally used as a scapegoat in Senate conflicts, but in this case he had never seen a ticket given unfairly. John Sillay suggested that "No Parking" signs be posted in the appropriate areas, and Johnny said this would have to be voted on next year. Keith Davis made a motion that the discussion be closed. Everyone seconded.

Johnny stated his qualifications and reason for running for office. He said that he knew he'd be called a lot of things but he didn't care. We can't have an effective Student Senate with discord among us. We have to work together. Everyone apologized and said that no offence was intended.

A question was asked about what the money from the ticketing was used for. Dean Wright said that it is being set up in the bank with the intention to use it for paving the parking lots when enough is collected.

Johnny thanked everyone for the points that had been brought up, and the meeting was adjourned.

STUDENT SENATE MINUTES--CONVOCATION

The Student Senate of Young Harris College met in Clegg Auditorium for a convocation on September 25, 1974. President Johnny Shelnuttt explained the purpose of the convocation and called the meeting to order. He introduced the new Senate members that were selected from the commuters: Sarah Cochran, Scott Jones, Mike King, and Debbie McNatt. The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved. A treasurer's report was given of \$3,300.30.

Johnny announced that the Senate, the Hall Staff, Dr. Dotson and Dean Wright will issue traffic tickets beginning tomorrow. The parking areas for men are Winship, Peel and Manget parking lots; for women, Center and West parking lots, the church below the Pool Hall; for commuters, along the Hased House on both sides of the road. No parking on the road in front of Sharp and PB. Dean Wright explained that there will be no parking beside PB because of construction. Faculty parking is behind the Susan B. Chapel from the tree back. Dr. Farley answered further questions about parking. There was a suggestion that the planned paved drive for in front of the pool be used for parking.

There was a period of questions and answers. Keith Davis asked if the funds being used for the new wall in front of the school could have been used for something else. Dr. Farley explained that certain funds are restricted and can only be used as stated by the doner. This was the case with the wall. There was a question about the traffic ticket fine money--it will be used toward paving the parking lots. There was another question about parking on the grassy areas behind Manget since the parking lot is grassy--John Sillay expressed the opinion that this would be no problem since that was where grass had grown up over the gravel. Questions about hot water for Peel and the speed breakers behind the girls' dorms were appropriately answered.

Johnny requested that the questioning be ended and we move on to the business at hand. There were several petitions brought before the Senate and discussed. The first was from Appleby West requesting laundry facilities and adequate TV. Mary Webster stated that Center does not have adequate TV, and someone else stated that Peel has no TV. Jane Chambliss asked that the dryers that do work in East be used by those girls that live in East first, then by residents of other dorms. John Sillay requested that ^{all} dorms be gone over as they are filthy. There was applause. Johnny will present the petition

and requests to Dean Wright.

The next petition was from Sigma Beta Sigma sorority requesting that society funds be used as the society wishes to use them, and that the advisor remain as an advisor and not a parent figure. The petition received a standing ovation. Johnny explained that there had been discussion about this issue at the Leadership Workshop, and nothing had been accomplished. He and Moose went to Dr. Farley and discussed it with him. Dr. Farley had said that if members of a society take their individual monies and place them in an account under a member's name, this money may be used in any way the society sees fit. The question was asked: what should fraternity funds be used for if not for the fraternity? Johnny stated that this new ruling was aimed especially at the practice of bailing fraternity brothers out of jail or buying beer with the fraternity funds. Another question: if a sorority raises money on its own time, why can't the members spend it as they like? Dr. Farley came to the microphone to explain. He stated that the faculty is not trying to tell societies how to spend their money. The issue is that the purpose for a society is written in the constitution that is presented to Dean Wright, and when society money is used for booze parties, the purpose so stated is not being consistently followed. Neither is the purpose of the school. There was a question: What should the funds be used for, then? For dinners, scholarships, social affairs consistent with the purpose of the society and school was the reply. There was another question: Why does the faculty take the attitude that society funds will be used for beer parties and bailing people out of jail? Rev. Page answered that last year there were five instances that fines and bails were paid directly from society treasuries. Stan Seckinger, president of Sigs, stood and said that no money had been paid from the Sig treasury for bonds; the Sigs had represented someone before, but no cash had been exchanged. Wesley Corbitt, president of Phi Chi, stated that bonds paid by Phi Chi had never been cashed, the person caught by the police paid for himself, and it had never happened again. A representative from KTO, Phi Delta, and Phi Chi each stood and stated that his society agreed with and supported the petition presented by Sigma Beta Sigma. Johnny pointed out that this new rule applied to every organization, not just the societies. John Sillay made a motion that the clause about society spending be stricken from the handbook. The motion was seconded and passed with a unanimous vote.

John Sillay read the petition from the Student Co-alition, explained it, and presented it to the secretary. Johnny will present it to Dean Wright.

A suggestion was made that the Student Senate set up a fact-finding committee to investigate the local police force and the reasons behind local laws. If any irregularities are found the committee should go before the city council. Johnny said that this suggestion would be presented to the rules committee.

A question was raised as to why women had to have a curfew when men did not. Johnny explained that a bill was being debated in Washington about this, and if it is passed, the women's curfew will either be dropped or the men will get a curfew. In all probability the women's curfew will be dropped. The question was raised as to why the school doesn't go ahead and drop the curfew anyway. Dr. Farley stated that the Board of Trustees felt that this would be too drastic a change in policy. John Crowley stated that this is a private school, with rules and regulations, and if a student did not want to abide by these regulations he should not have come here. Johnny explained that the Senate can discuss a motion, pass it unanimously, sign it, and it goes to PB and remains in deadlock. The Senate needs the support of the student body if it expects to get anything done. John Sillay made a motion that we make a bill and vote on it at the next meeting. The motion was seconded and passed.

A letter was read from Senators Tony Mobley and Eddie Carlan requesting that the Senate be allowed to choose its own advisor, instead of having the Dean of Students appointed as the advisor. They felt that this put too much responsibility on the Dean and another advisor from among the faculty would make a better balance of power. The matter will be discussed and voted on at the next meeting.

Johnny said in closing that competition between the fraternities and sororities was great, but we had seen more coming ^{together} / tonight that ever before, and we as students can really accomplish something if we work together. He further stated that the Senate in no way condones the stealing of the bust from PB; it was crazy, absurd, and the Senate will have no part of it. It accomplished nothing. Tommy Fields, Stan Seckinger, and Wesley Corbitt, presidents of the three fraternities, stood and Tommy spoke for all three.

He stated that in past years Sigs, Phi Chi and KTO had been going for blood, but all three fraternities agree that this year will be different. They pledge to work together as students instead of individual fraternity members. There was applause.

The meeting was adjourned.

STUDENT SENATE MINUTES

The Student Senate of Young Harris College met on October 7, 1974. President Johnny Shelnuttt called the meeting to order. The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

Moose McMillan made a motion that two tardies to a meeting count as an absense. The motion was seconded and carried 16 to 5.

Johnny reported that he had taken the petitions from the last meeting before Dean Wright, but that there had been no response so far. Dr. Farley would see about the washing machines and dryers.

The question was raised about ticketing on week-ends. There will be ticketing on week-ends. It is explained in the handbook and everyone should know by now what can and cannot be done. Sharp is off limits at all times with the exception of the faculty. John Sillay is supposed to be looking into Parking Signs.

Johnny thanked everyone for help with the freshmen elections, and announced the new officers:

- President--Steve Burrell
- V-President--Jeff Beasley
- Sec-Treasurer--Angie McNutt
- Sargent at Arms--Cricket Justice

The problem of students being thrown in to the Spat fountain was discussed. The fine will be left to the descretion of the Senate member observing the act. Take the name of the guilty person or persons and report to Dean Wright.

The curfew question for ^{girls} was raised and discussed again. Mrs. Day was reported to have said that the dorms were locked more for keeping people out than locking people in. Jane pointed out that it is also used simply to keep up with the girls.

Roddy Moore, president of the Spat Club, came before the Senate requesting assistance for the payment of the band for the Spat formal. He explained that the Spat Club had lost \$400 profit this summer from the soft drink machines, and they also wanted to put more money into a service project this year instead of spending so much on the formal. They are spending \$700 now for the food and band, and are requesting \$200 for help with the band. Roddy stressed that the money spent is going strictly for the students, not tuexdoes and the like.

The motion was voted on and carried 21 to 2.


Chuck Hendrix came before the Senate and requested assistance for the payment for the Ed Kilburn concert. The total cost is \$500, and the Sigs are paying \$125 and the Susan B.'s are paying \$125. Would the Senate be able to pay \$125 also?

There was much discussion. It was explained that the idea is not to make profit, but for student enjoyment. There will be a charge simply for the Sigs and Susan B.'s to break even. Question: Why charge students when the money we use to pay for it is from the activity cards they've already paid for? It was also asked why should the Senate pay when Sigs and Susan B.'s will pocket the money. Claude explained that they just wanted to break even, not to lose money because they did a service project separate from this. It was stated that if the Senate keeps paying money to help this society and that club, it will cut down on the quality of the activities we provide for the students. This was followed by the statement that this activity is for the students, and it will cost less than if the Senate paid for it themselves. Discussion continued in this manner.

A motion was made, voted on, and passed 19 to 5.

Johnny had to leave, so Moose took over as head. There was more discussion about the preceding motion, and it was decided to amend the motion. Judy Farris made a motion that we amend the preceding motion about the Ed Kilburn concert, that all profit after the Sigs and Susan B.'s break even be returned to Senate treasury. It was seconded, and passed 21 to 1.

The meeting was closed to the public.

STUDENT SENATE MINUTES

The Student Senate of Young Harris College met on October 21, 1974. President Johnny Shelnuttt called the meeting to order. Mr. Nichols, our new advisor, was introduced and welcomed. The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

The Senate will pay \$75 toward the Ed Kilburn concert instead of \$125. Coach Nichols stated that he had talked to Johnny and a few other Senate members about his hopes for the Senate. He has plans that we can discuss issues that are not so material--issues that theoretically can help the school.

Plans were made for convos coming up in the next two weeks, and senators were assigned to give out and take up convocation cards. The Ed Kilburn concert will have convocation credit.

There will be not traffic tickets given on Parents and Alumni Weekend. Johnny reminded us again that tickets will be given on week-ends with the exception of the next two weekends. Keith Davis suggested that a little discretion be shown on the part of the Senate members, and that we should stop being so big about giving tickets. There was discussion. Tickets will be given when a rule or law has been broken. Eddie Carlan pointed out that several minor details about parking have been left out of the handbook, such as rules about blocking people in the parking lots. There will be a fine if the permit is not placed in the proper place on the car. This is discussed in the handbook. What about commuters who drive several different cars? Rick Ballew said that he drives more than one car, and had talked to Dean Wright about it. The dean had stated that he would give an equal amount of permits as the number of cars driven, and the student would only have to register once. Johnny reminded everyone that the discipline committee is supposed to handle ticketing and issues involved with it. Claude suggested that the Senate investigate the handling of the ticket money and see why Dean Wright doesn't honor every ticket given. Eddie Carlan said that Dean Wright cannot rightfully fine someone for something that is not covered in the handbook. Johnny stated that the discipline should meet and discuss these suggestions and bring them before the Senate in the form of a motion at the next meeting.

The petitions read and discussed at the convocation meeting have been reviewed by Dean Wright and his replies have been returned.

Regarding traffic matters: A detailed report will be available for the next meeting. Generally, most tickets have been paid correctly. Some are delinquent, some have been marked OK, and one will be appealed before the Campus Judicial Board. Would the Senate discuss whether a fine will be charged for misplacement of the permit. There will be a fine as is stated in the handbook.

At this point Johnny explained the importance of the Senate approving each petition--making a motion and voting. The Senate is the link between students and the administration.

Regarding petition from Appleby West: The conditions referred to have previously been brought to the attention of the dean. They are being attended to. A suggestion: inform the hall staff of any maintenance problem. It will be brought directly to the office. If there is a delay, it is usually due to persons on campus expecting that maintenance can read minds, which is not the case. Don't waste time on petitions; report the problem.

Regarding the petition of the Student Coalition: The charter of this organization had been suspended because it had held no meetings after the beginning of last year. John Sillay had been informed by the dean that if persons were interested in re-forming this organization, they should check the requirements listed in the Guide and work on those instead of circulating petitions. Anyone interested in looking at the constitution of the old "Coalition" may do so.

Regarding the petition from Sigma Beta Sigma: The section referred to in the petition will remain as currently stated. This college does not regulate organizational finances as strictly as do other colleges. Certain guidelines are necessary if campus organizations are to continue to operate within the framework of the College's philosophy as it applies to them. The advisor shares a responsibility for seeing that the organization operates in a proper manner. Concerning bonding a member who is in jail: the office now recommends that such expenditures be approved in all cases by all advisors, as long as the amount used as bond is not made an actual expense and is returned to the organization.

Question: What is Student Co-olition? It is a political organization that was organized in a election year to promote party spirit.

Johnny announced that our picture for the annual will be \$100 for two pages. It was decided that the picture would be taken in Clegg at the next meeting.

Rick Ballew stated that several students had asked that the Senate look into classes outside of classes, as they felt this was not fair and took up too much time. And what about the practice of calling in a class on Thursday night when the teacher will not be present at class time on Friday?

Mr. Nichols suggested that the Senate check with Dr. Dotson on this matter. Rick made a motion that someone check into this matter with Dr. Dotson, it was seconded, and passed 27 to 0. Rick will handle this.

Judy reported on the last faculty meeting. Exemption tests for other subjects besides English and Math were discussed. The parents of Jim Heinz are putting up a scholarship for something that typifies the spirit of Young Harris College.

Johnny will represent the Student Body with Dr. Dotson and Dr. Hale in Atlanta on November 8.

Coach Nichols asked for discussion on the problem of cheating in classes and outside of classes on Campus. There was discussion. It was felt that the problem was not as bad as it was last year. Mr. Bowers felt that there had not been much of a change.

Johnny reported that Dr. Farley is highly satisfied with the work the Senate is doing and states that his doors are always open to the Senate and other students.

David Kuykendall asked that he be allowed to bring something before the Senate. He feels that the students of Young Harris, led by the Senate, should voluntarily come up with a program to cut down on electricity spent by the school. Entirely too much is spent, and we could be an example to others about this. Mr. Bowers asked that we do this for energy as well as lights. Ed Basset asked that the times that the heat is turned on be switched. Mr. Nichols said that Dr. Farley is aware of this problem and has been after the electric company to set up a timer for the tennis courts. A motion was made and seconded. It passed 27 to 0. A committee was formed with David and Claude as co-chairmen. Members are Jane McMillan, Nancy Duke & Joye Brock, and Eddie Carlan. Johnny and Mr. Nichols are automatic members.

This committee will look into what can be done and report back to the Senate at the next meeting.

There was no further business and the meeting was adjourned.

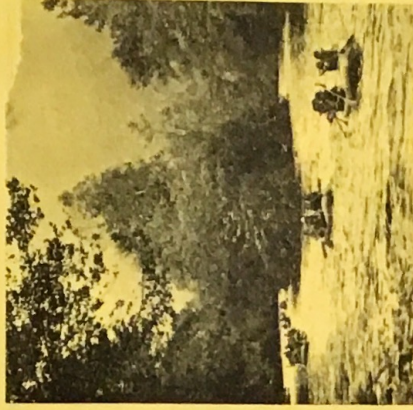

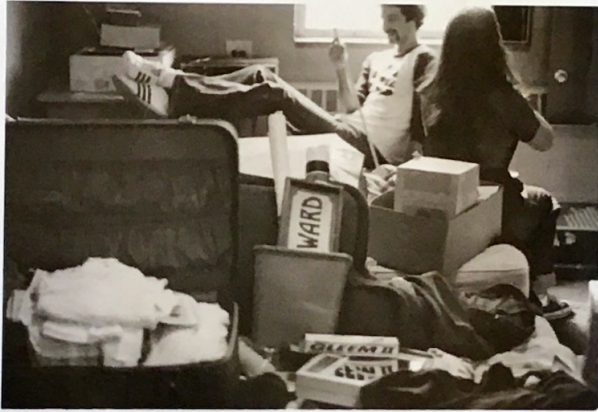
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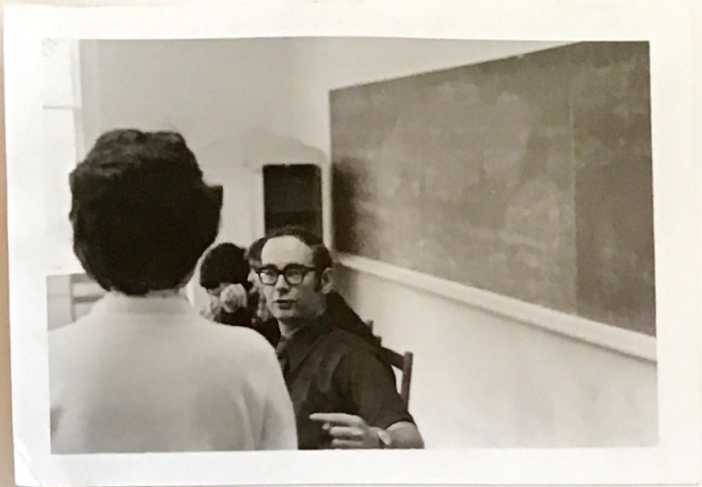

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STUDENTSENATE MINUTES

The Student Senate of Young Harris College met on January 6, 1975. President Johnny Shelnuttt called the meeting to order. The roll was called, the minutes read and approved. A balance of \$3,131.80 was reported to be in the bank.

Activity cards can be sold this quarter; the price will go down to \$7.00.

Eddie Carlan is on academic probation and is off the Senate until he raises his average, hopefully by mid-term.

Johnny had several things to discuss:

The Senate had another convocation scheduled for Jan. 27. It was decided that we would conduct this one like the last one. A motion was made and passed unanimously.

There has still been much griping about parking tickets. The discipline committee is ordered to meet and draw up some recommendations to be typed and presented to Johnny by Thursday or Friday of this week. They should discuss such questions as whether a first warning should be given before a ticket, and some ideas on new places to park. This is to be taken before the dean, and three copies are required.

John Sillay suggested that the area behind Winship be paved. Dean Wright has blueprints for new driveways and grass for this area, and it will be handled by the same company that is landscaping the road by the church.

The food committee is to meet with Mr. B. The two freshmen members of the Senate are appointed to the food committee. Three typed copies of the minutes from the meeting are requested.

There was much discussion about the food served in the lunchroom. The following complaints were given: why have 4 desserts and soybean burgers--cut the desserts and spend the money on meat; people that could in toward the end of the serving time either get leftovers or no food at all--something should be done about this; the new hours are not good ones; why was continental breakfast cut out; why couldn't cereal and milk be left out for those who want it. It was emphasised that if a certain food or drink is promised, it should be there. We pay for chocolate milk, we should get it.

Judy Farris pointed that a lot of the problem is laziness of the staff in getting more milk, etc., out. Mr. Nichols expressed the opinion that this food was actually very good food compared to food served in other institutions. We get a balanced meal, and a lot of it.

Heather asked that the Senate and other students please support her committee and the meeting with Mr. B. More could be done with proper support.

There will be a movie--"Day of the Jackal"--in Clegg Saturday night.

Johnny requested that Senate members help keep noise down in the library and the dorms. Don't wait for the dorm ~~director~~ assistant; he's usually making half the noise himself.

Johnny will attend a meeting in Atlanta on Jan. 19-20 concerning the girl's curfew. Dr. Hale and Dr. Dotson will accompany him.

The Senate must elect a new Senate member to take Keith Davis' place, and 3 members to go on the Campus Judicial Board.

It was suggested that this part of the meeting remain open to the public. A motion was made concerning this, but it did not pass.

Coach Nichols made the suggestion that the Senate and student body make an effort to look outside our immediate surroundings and do something to help the problem of starvation in other countries. Why not once a month, or every two weeks, we eat 30 grains of rice for supper, as they do, and send the money saved to these starving people. Mr. B. thought it could be worked out. There was discussion. It was suggested that a line for those who did not want to participate be provided, and the other be open for those who were willing to sacrifice. It must be very well planned or it will not work. It was suggested that this idea be presented to the student body and our Senate convocation. It will be discussed further at the next meeting.

There was no further business, and the Senate adjourned to the Senate room.

STUDENT SENATE MINUTES

The Student Senate of Young Harris College met on January 23, 1975. President Johnny Shelnuttt called the meeting to order. The roll was called, the minutes were read and approved, and a budget report of \$2199.05 was given.

Johnny reported on the new rules for women's curfew. It will be extended until 3 AM on weekends beginning Jan. 24. Doors will be locked at 1 AM for security reasons, but girls will be admitted until 3:00. Curfew will remain 12 midnight on week nights, unless special permission is received from the dorm mother.

There was a very dangerous parking incident preceding this meeting in which a senate member almost got into a fight. Someone didn't agree with the rules and felt that he was receiving a ticket for personal reasons. It is ridiculous for this to happen when the rules have been known for 2 months. The incident will go before the campus Judicial Board.

Jane McMillan reported on the discipline committee meeting. Only a few senate members give tickets, and not consistently. When people do receive tickets, they feel they are being picked on. The question was raised as to why the faculty are allowed to park in front of Sharp when students are not. The parking rules should apply to everyone, not just students. If they don't, then the faculty should be the ones to issue tickets, not students. Coach Nichols pointed out that the faculty needs places to park so they won't spend a lot of time just searching for a place. Parking areas should be provided for them, and then the rules can apply to all. There was discussion.

Heather reported on the food committee meeting. She said that Mr. B. seemed to be trying with what he had to work with. Everything seems to be broken down. Someone suggested a new lunchroom advisor, but Johnny said we couldn't do that. Coach Nichols said that the faculty wants Mr. B., and he had turned down other offers elsewhere to stay here. It was stated that we have a contract with Mr. B. and we should get results instead of excuses from him. There was more discussion along this line. It was then pointed out that we seem to spend an awful lot of time on food and not enough on more important things.

There was discussion on the rice dinner for raising money for starving children. Rev. Kay had said that we would be able to designate the country and food relief we want, and it will go 100% to those people. We can save around \$300. Someone suggested using this money on birth control instead of food. Coach Nichols said that Mr. Dyer and Rev. Kay were the only faculty members who supported the idea. Others felt that the students would react the same way. It was then suggested that we do it anyway--it would be worth it if only 2 people did it. We're just too lazy. It was decided that we would decide on a date and put up a sign in the lunchroom and let people who wanted to participate sign up. It will be presented at convocation by Coach Nichols.

It was decided that we would elect someone to represent the Senate in the Miss Enochah Pagent at the next meeting.

A new member for the Campus Judicial Board was elected, as Kathy Ackerman cannot serve because she is on the dorm council. Judy Farris was elected.

There was no further business so the meeting was adjourned.

If you cannot get things changed that need changing on a campus of 400-500 students, what are you going to do in life when your confronted with the same problem?

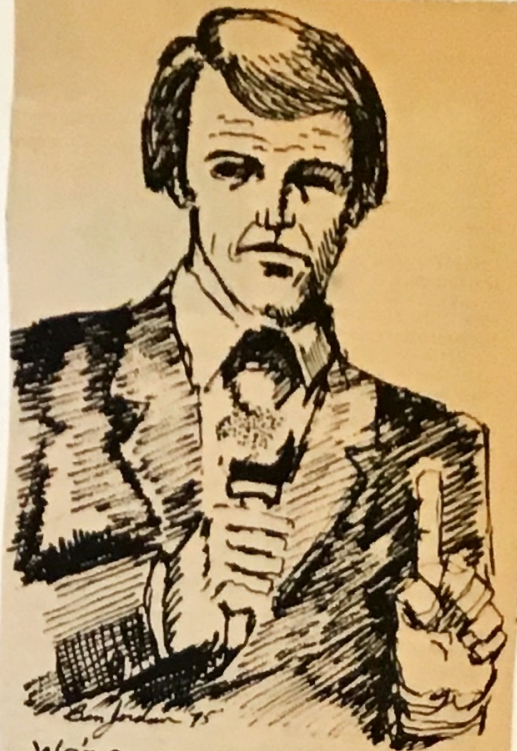
Let's work together with each other and with the Administration on getting these constructional changes.

The Student Senate of Young Harris College met on October 7, 1974. President Johnny Shelnut called the meeting to order. The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

Mosse McMillan made a motion that two tardies to a meeting count as an absense. The motion was seconded and carried 16 to 5.

It was reported that he had taken the report that he had meeting minutes from the last but that there was no response so far. There would see about the Farley machines and dryers.

The question was raised about ticketing on week-ends. There will be ticketing on weekends. It is explained in the handbook and everyone should know by now what can and cannot be done. A motion was made, voted one, and passed 19 to 5.

Johnny had to leave, so Moose took over as head. There was more discussion about the preceding motion, and it was decided to amend the motion. The Student Senate of Young Harris College met in Clegg Auditorium for a convocation on September 25, 1974. President Johnny Shelnut explained the purpose of the convocation and called the meeting to order. He introduced the new Senate members that were selected from the freshmen. The treasurer's report was given of \$3,300.30.

Johnny announced that the Senate, the Hall Staff, Dr. Dotson and Dean Wright will issue traffic tickets beginning next week. The parking areas are: the parking areas behind the Pool Hall; for commuters, the church below the Hesed House on both sides of the road. No parking on the road in front of Sharp and PB. Dean Wright explained that there will be no parking beside PB because of construction. Faculty parking is behind the Susan B. Chapel from the tree back. Dr. Farley answered further questions about parking. There was a suggestion that the planned paved drive for in front of the pool be used for parking.

There was a period of questions and answers. Keith Davis asked if the funds being used for the new wall in front of the school could have been used for something else. Dr. Farley explained that certain funds are restricted and can only be used as stated by the donor. This was the case with the wall. There was a question about the traffic ticket fine money—it will be used toward paving the parking lots. There was another question about parking on the grassy areas behind Manget since the parking lot is grassy—John Sillay expressed the opinion that this would be no problem since that was where grass had grown up over the gravel. Questions about hot water for Peel and the speed breakers behind the girls' dorms were appropriately answered.

Johnny requested that the questioning be ended and that we move on to the business at hand.

There were several petitions brought before the Senate and discussed. The first was a

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
