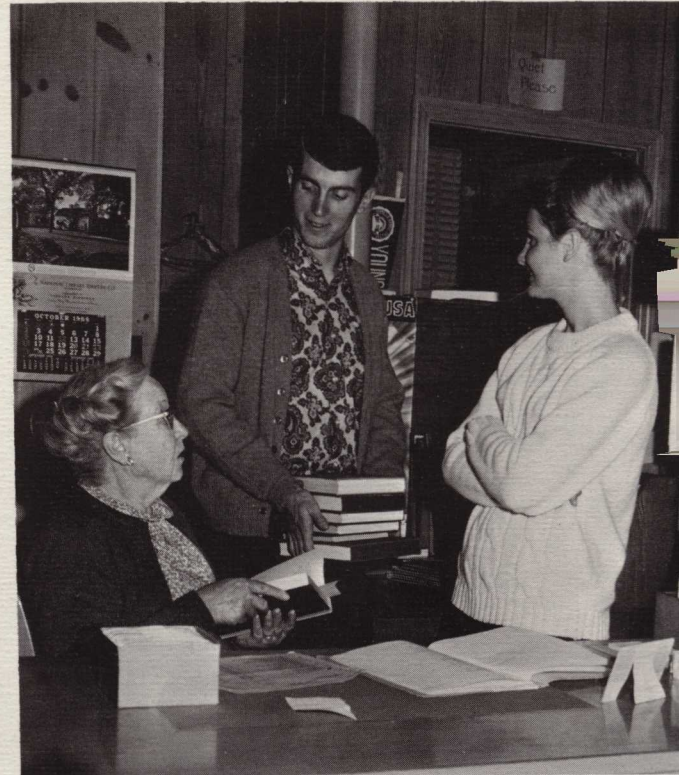

Public Relations

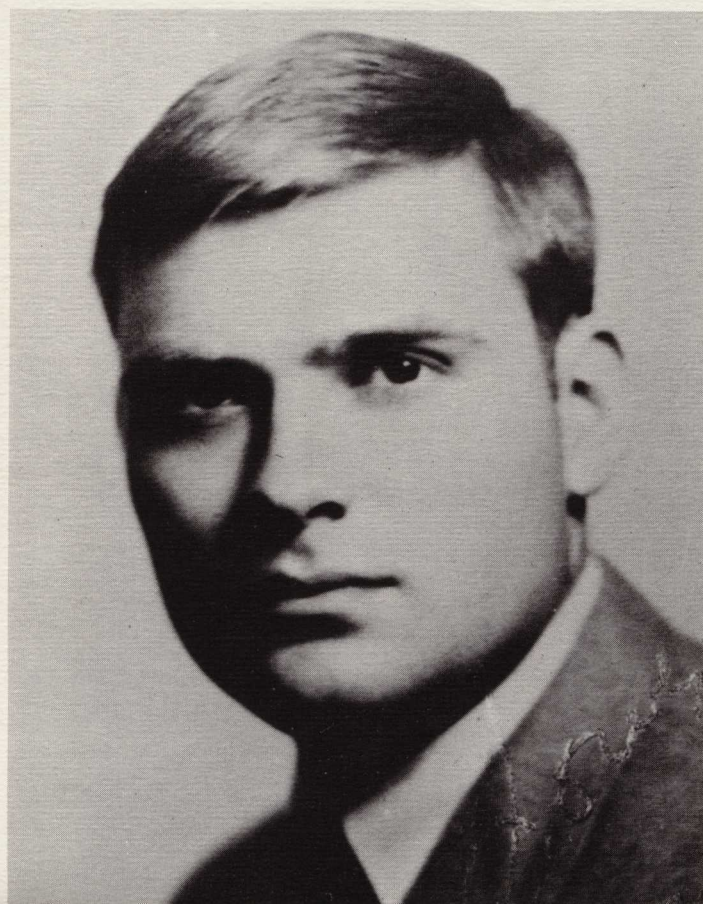

Dean of Women

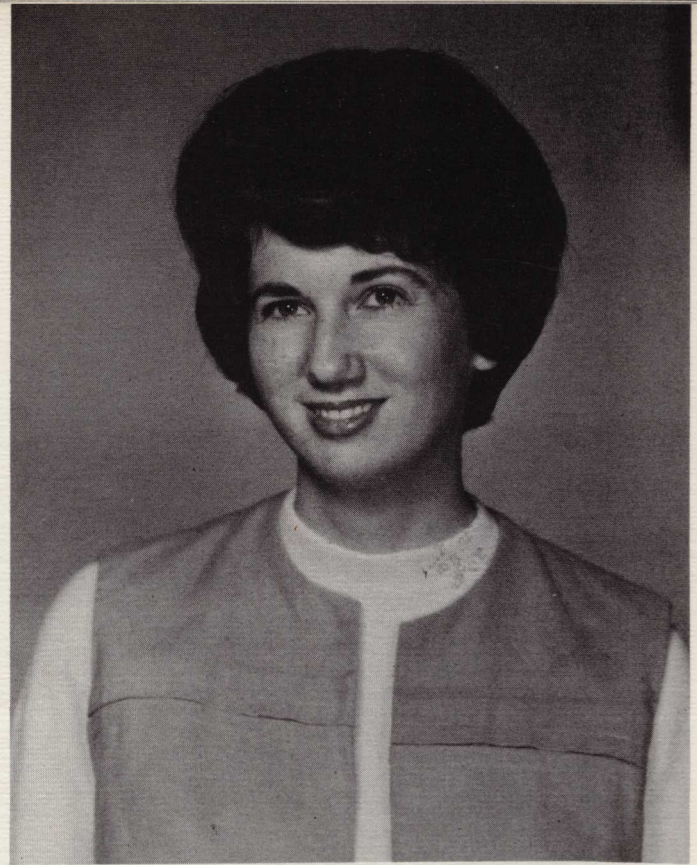

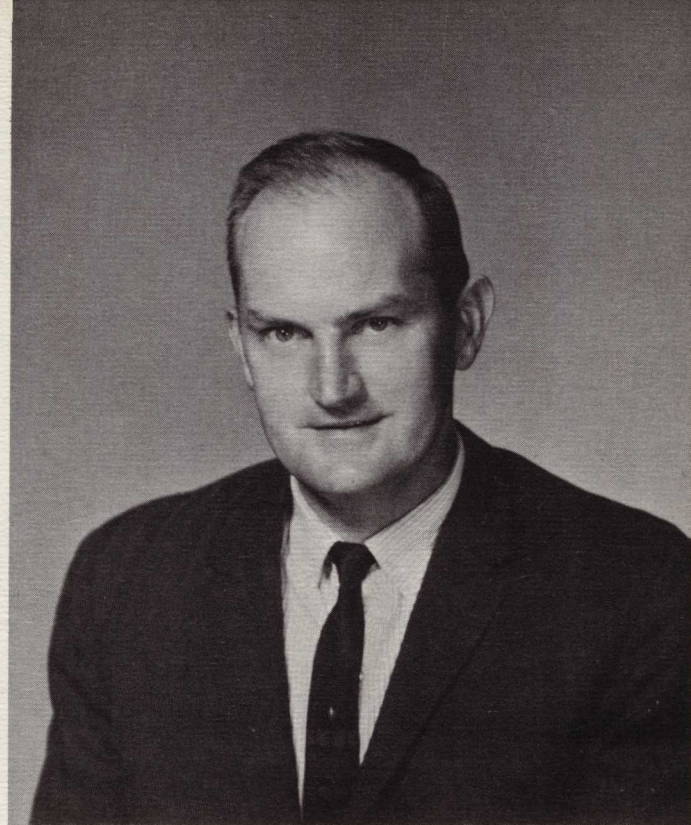
Mr. Charles Adams

Mr. Todd Kimsey

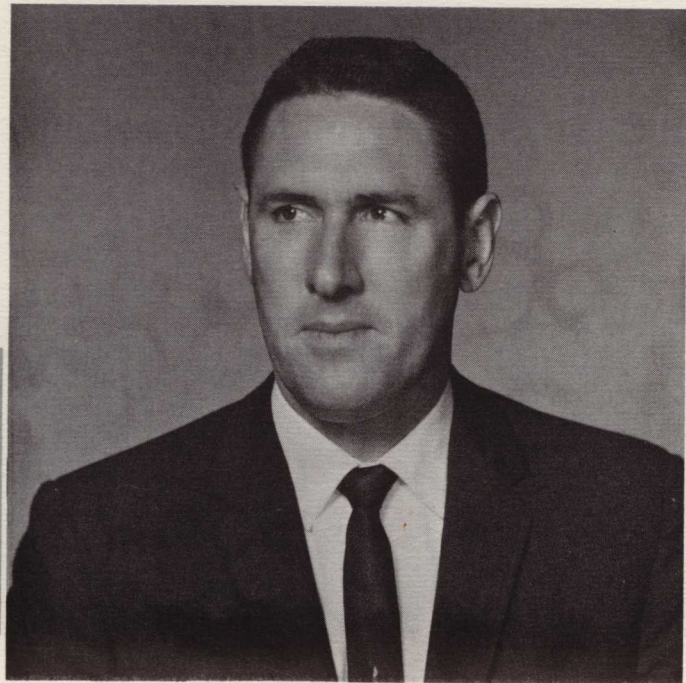

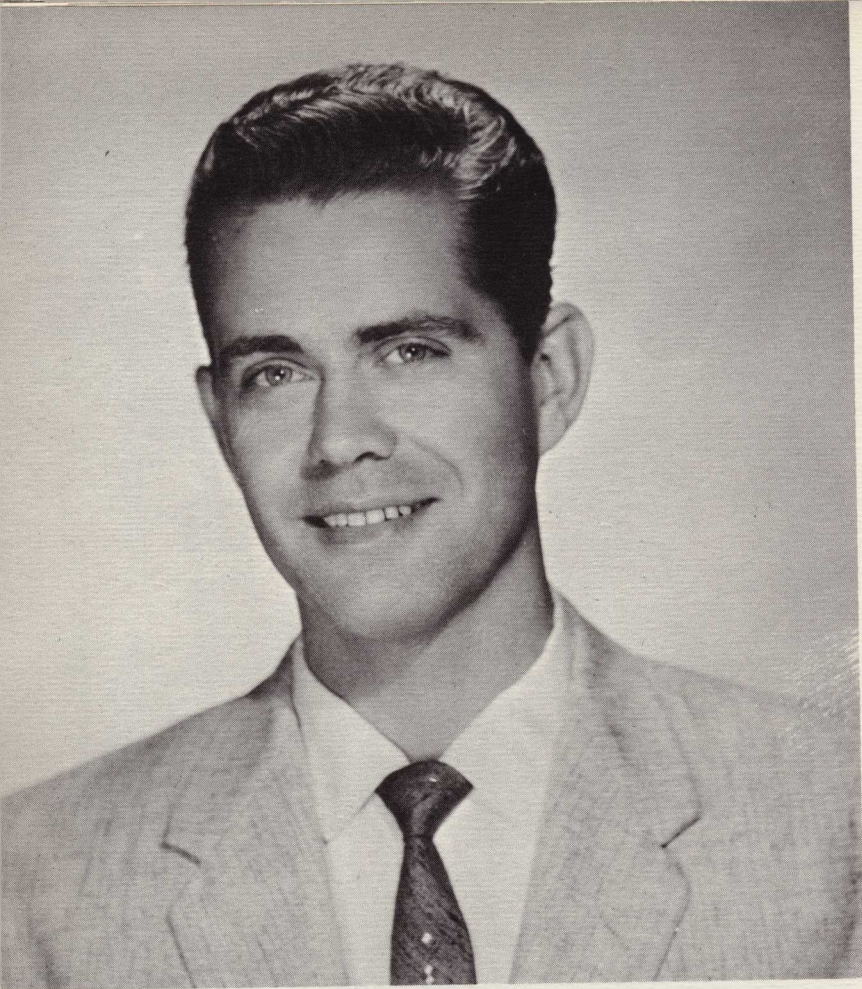
Mr. Henry Hedden

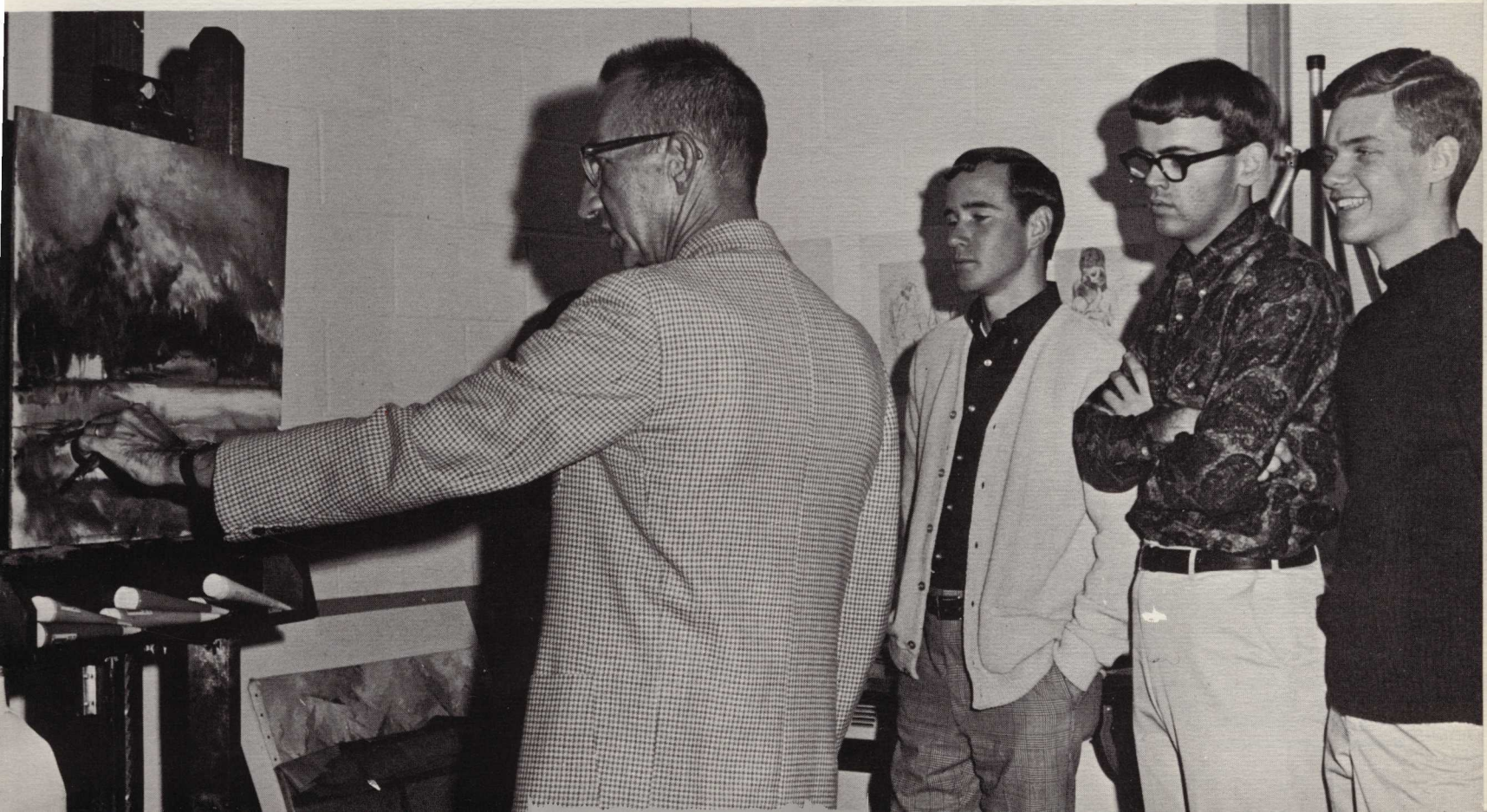

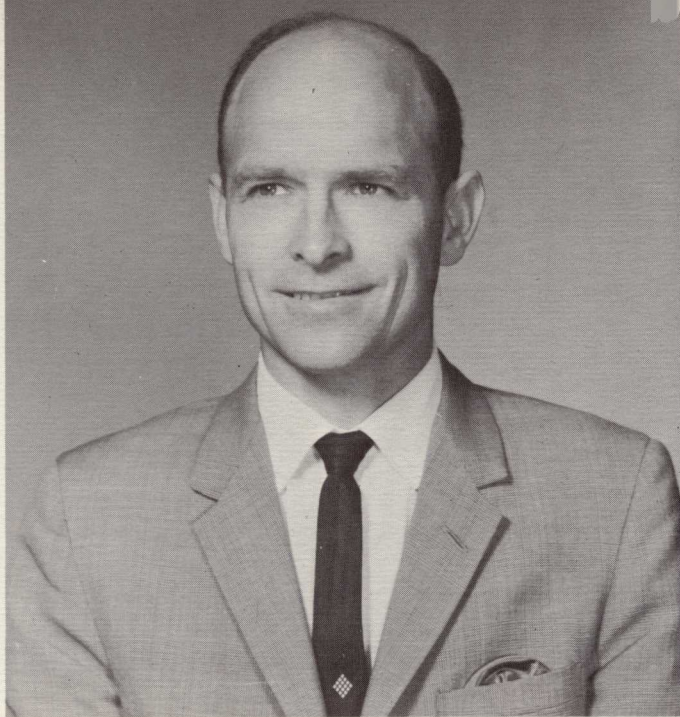
Mr. William O. Brazil

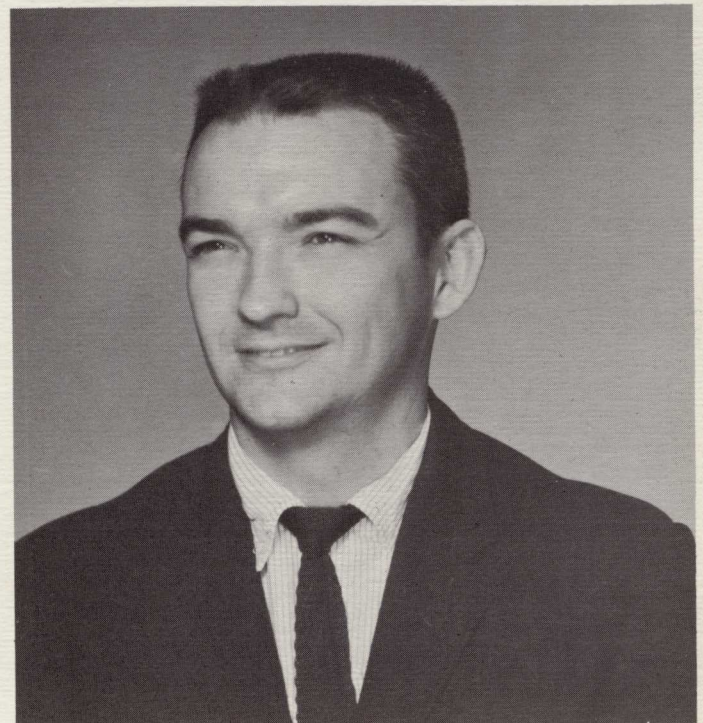
Mr. Cecil Page

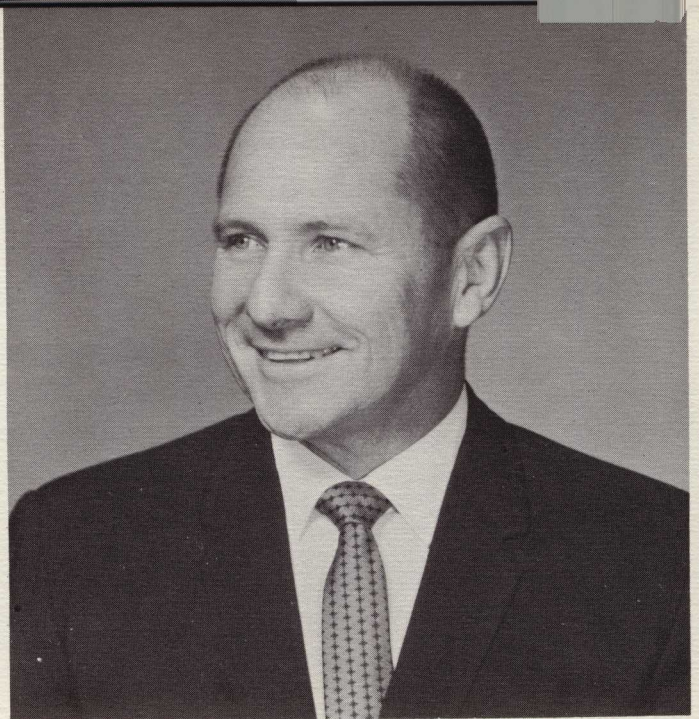

PHYSICAL FITNESS - IMPORTANT ASPECT AT YHC

The vital core of the educational process on any college campus is found within the walls of the college library. Here the knowledge of ages past is preserved by the written word. From a look at the significance of the past and the events currently of value, the student may gain a clearer understanding of what lies ahead in the future of man.

Young Harris College Library, under the direction of Mrs. Leslie Jones, has seen a phenomenal growth and change in recent months.

During the ten years that Mrs. Jones has served as librarian, she has seen the library enlarged from a former one floor space area to take in the mezzanine floor and the excavated downstairs rooms. While the new building was being constructed, Mrs. Jones made many trips in the interests of proper furnishings for it. She made numerous trips to Atlanta, and in New York she met for a three-day period with the American Library Institute for library furniture. The days were divided into three sessions that lasted each day from nine in the morning till ten in the evening.

Mrs. Jones is a native of Hartwell, Georgia. She was graduated with an A.B. from Piedmont College, Demorest, Georgia, where she served for ten years as a librarian. She earned her M.A. in Library Science at George Peabody College, Nashville, Tennessee. She has also taught in the Towns County Public Schools. The J. Lon Duckworth Library, named in memory of the late Executive Vice-President of the Young Harris College Board of Trustees of Atlanta, Georgia, was a dream that has become a reality. It is a much needed and long awaited building. When the library is completely finished, greatly improved facilities will be available for faculty and students.

A government grant in June helped to make possible the addition of many new items including: two hundred twenty-one slides and ninety art books compiled and directed by Skira for the Art Department; recordings for the Music and English Departments; two hundred fifty books for the general and reference collection, and a backlog of bindings in amount of 1918 volumes.

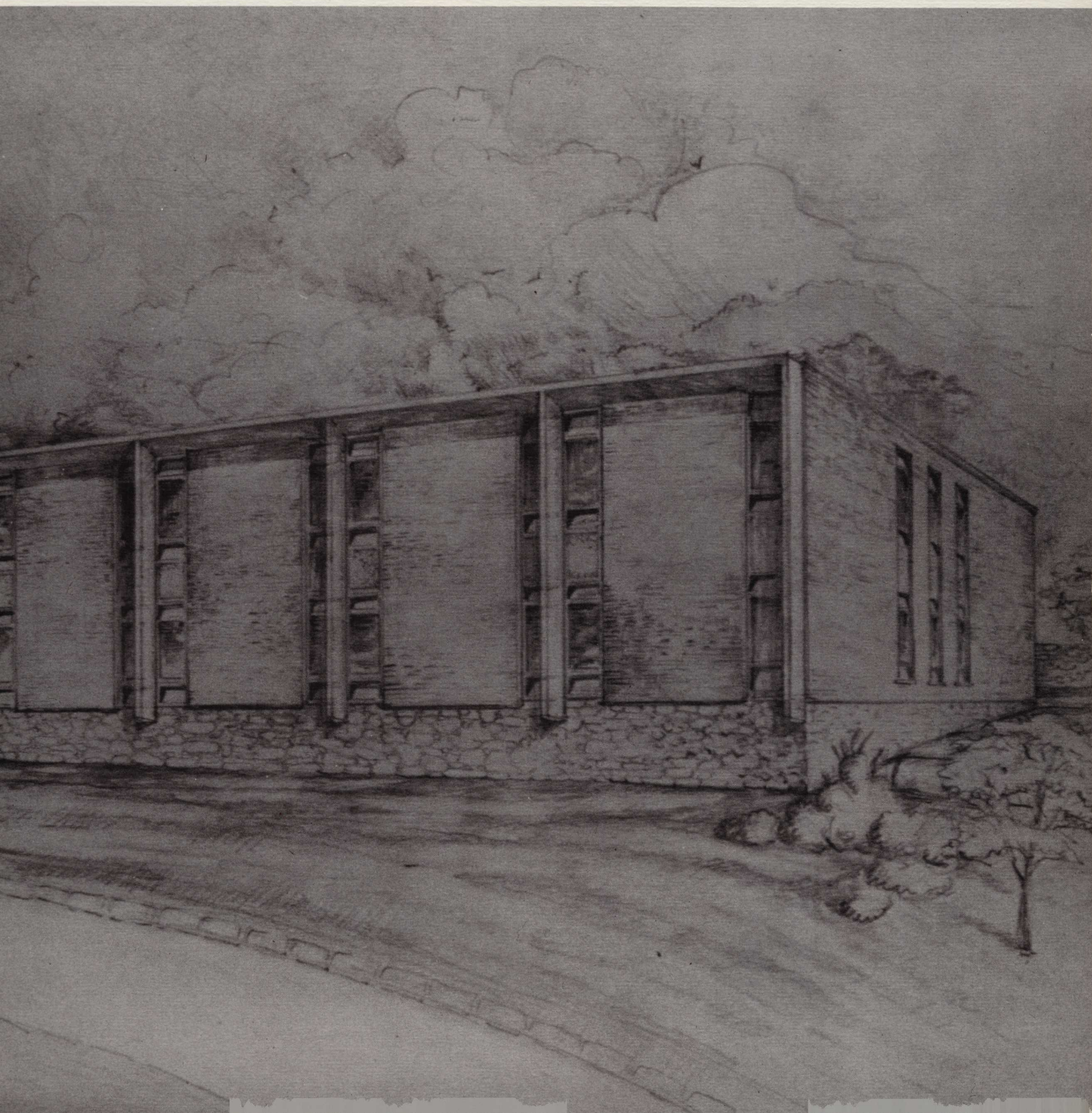

The Court is in session only for called meetings. Functions of this body include interpretation of the Student Senate Constitution and the approval of candidates for Student Senate positions.

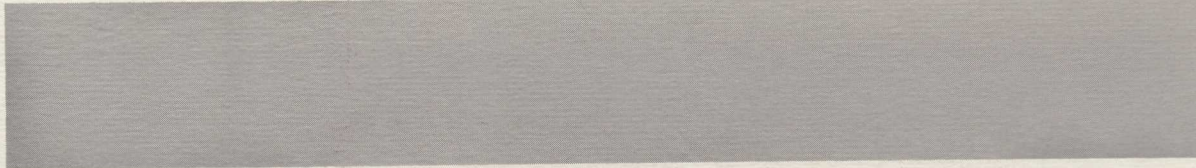

Eddie Johnson and Bob Reynolds were invited to join Phi Theta Kappa during the winter quarter of 1967.





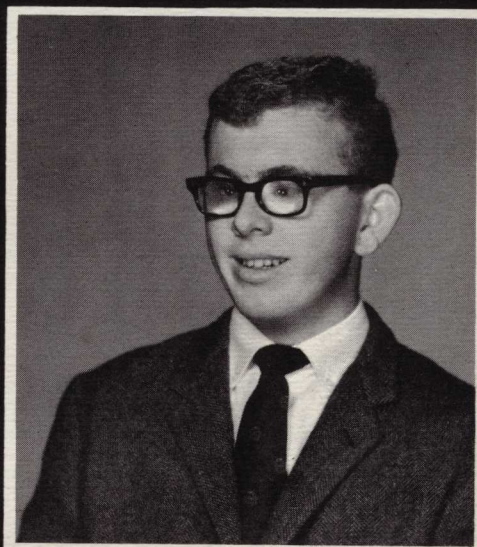

Chairs for the stage were presented to the college by Dorcas members. They have put bookshelves, coat racks, and chair covers in the dining hall.

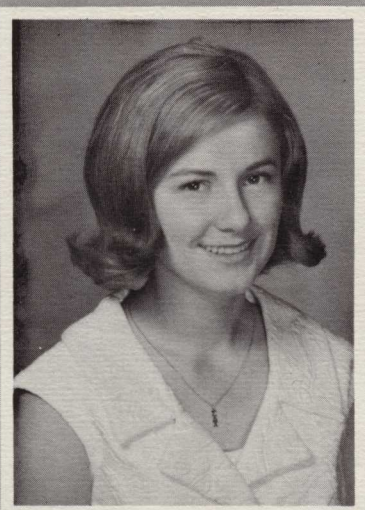

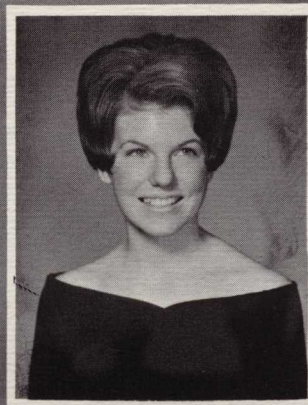
EXEMPLIFIES SERVICE

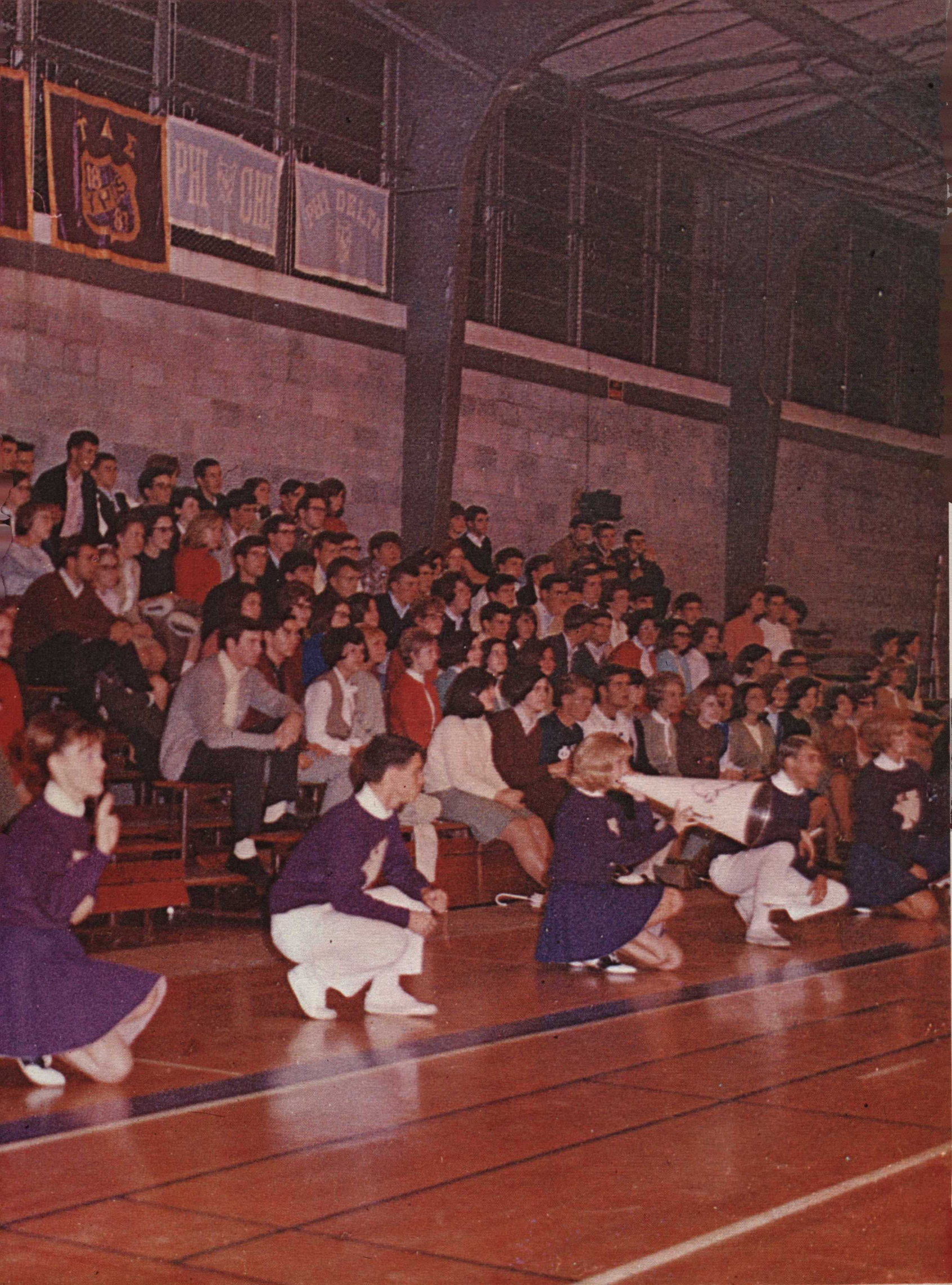

VICTORY SMILES ARE RADIATED BY WINNERS

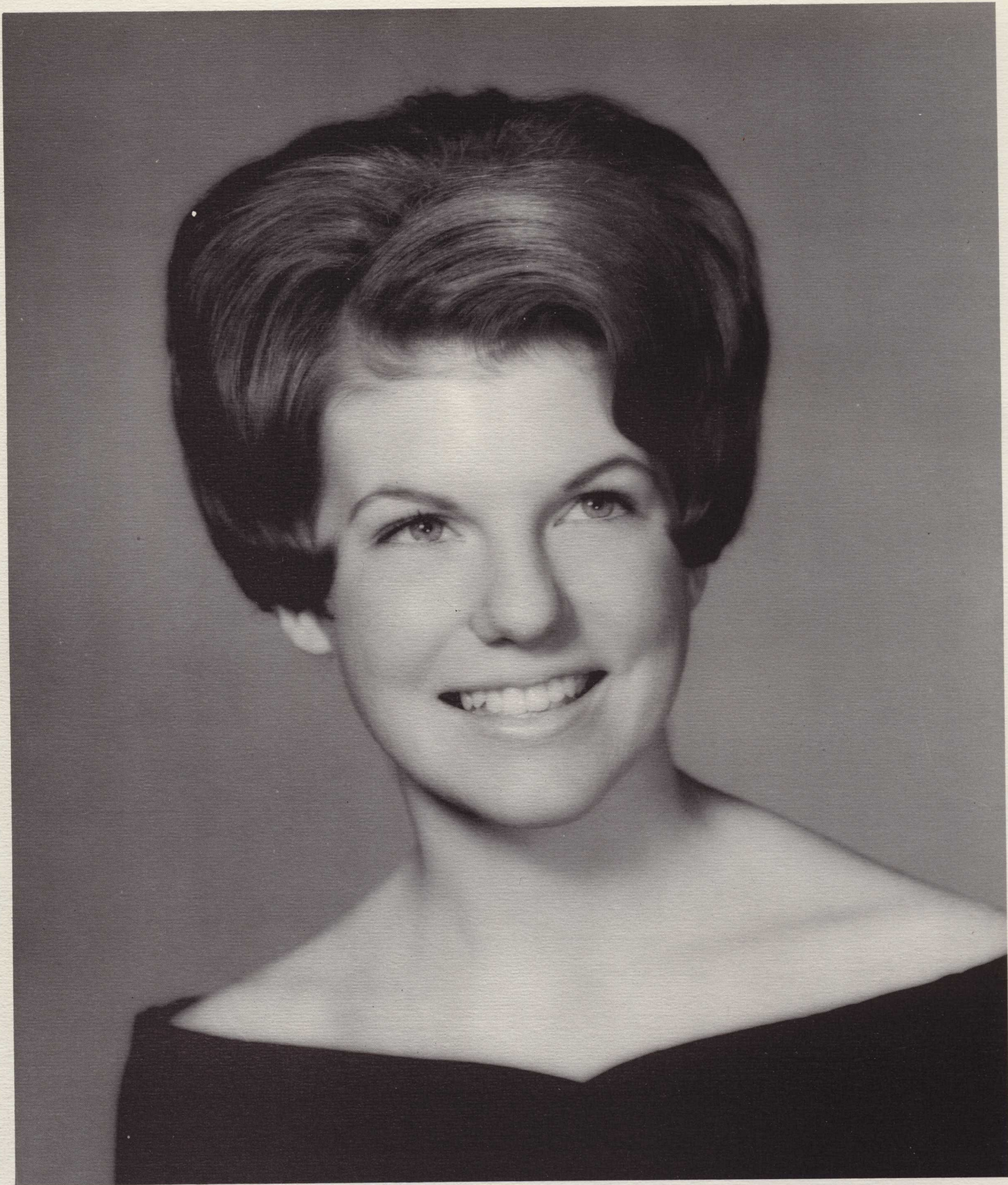

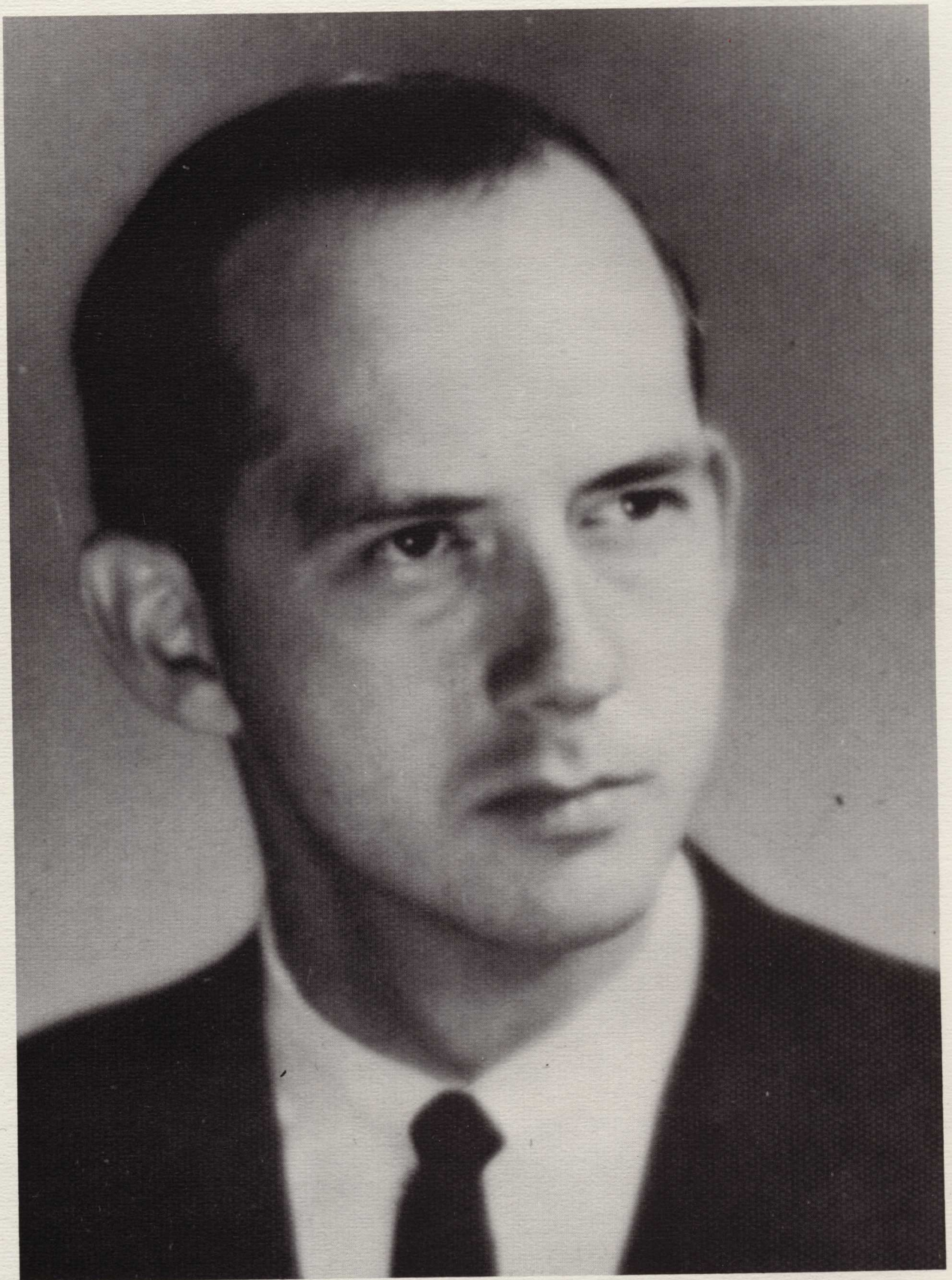
